On behalf of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, I'm pleased to welcome you to the Recognition of David Lindquist as the recipient of the Federation's "One of the Righteous" award.

The award is periodically given to an individual who enhances our community in general and the Jewish community in particular through their deeds and their work.

This afternoon, we will get to know David on several levels ...some of which you may already be familiar and some which you might not...

You'll learn about David – the husband, father and uncle and friendyou'll hear about David – the teacher and coach...and you'll become exposed to David's Holocaust efforts nationally and within our community... all culminating with the Jewish Federation's "One of the Righteous" Award.

So let us begin ...

David is the only child of Ray and Genevieve Lindquist...both served in WW II – Ray in the Pacific and Genevieve as a surgical nurse in Italy...Genevieve once commented that after operating in a tent a mile from the front line, few things bothered her. And looking at picture of little David is a suit and bow tie, he certainly didn't look like a handful. The family moved to Fort Wayne when he was in the 5th grade, when Ray took a job at The Harvester.

The Lindquist family is composed of stiff lipped conservative Swedes who enjoy lute fish and Swedish Rye bread. To this day, Dave loves all things Swedish including IKEA meatballs and herring...and speaking of IKEA – what do you call a cat that can put together furniture from IKEA...3-2-1 An Assembly KIT !...now that's a real funny Swedish joke !! or have you heard this one, one of Dave's favorites -Why does the Swedish Navy have bar codes on the sides of their ships??

So they can Scan-di-navian!!

Did you know that David was a hockey player turned hockey coach?? He was part of an era during which an old beat-up bus was revived in order to drive the team to various parts of Canada and the United States to compete --great stories of snowstorms, forgotten gear and helpful parents arose... One year he took a bunch of kids to Russia over New Year's where the kids had the chance not only to play hockey but become exposed to Russian culture, geography and politics.

Somewhere along the way, David developed a love for Siberian husky dogs...Carol recalls that when they began dating in earnest in 1999. She believes that he picked her for his wife because she had an energetic Husky pup. Had not he and her Husky gotten along...it remains an open question as to whether he would have proposed!!



An only child with few cousins, Dave married into a large and enthusiastic family... as a teacher at Snider, he had all of Carol's nieces and nephews in his classes and 2 of their 3 daughters. All complained about the rigor but all passed.

It was quite an adjustment to them when Carol and he married and they didn't have to call him Mr. Lindquist! To this day, however, he threatens them with homework assignments to be completed before the next family gathering!

Dave is best (or worst) known for his puns. He loves playing with language and even the 4 grandchildren have developed the skill of creating great puns...

Among his favorites...

He claims that he's Norwegian, Swedish and Danish – apparently there's more but his can't Finnish!

Or have you heard this one ...

A Swedish woman, two Swedish men and another Swedish woman ...walk into ABBA...

And among his favorite books are – Swedish humor. you're joking and the classic Swedish Humor and other Myths.

Now, we don't want this to seem like a Eulogy; but as you may recall, David was a hockey coach but what I didn't share was that he was also coach of a state-ranked girls' golf team...

If there is someone from either sport who would like to share a brief memory or two, come on down...

Through word and deed, David embodies the value of ecumenical dialogue in building peace within and beyond our community. His impact has been vast on his students, teachers, and adults as he strives to understand the challenges of anti-Semitism both now and during the Holocaust.

"In those times there was darkness everywhere...In heaven and on earth...ALL the gates of compassion seemed to have been closed! The KILLER killed and the Jews died and the outside world adopted an attitude either of complicity or indifference.

Only a few had the courage to care.

These few men and women were vulnerable, afraid, helpless –what made them different from their fellow citizens?...Why were there so few?

Let us remember. What hurts the victims most is not the cruelty of the oppressor but the silence of the bystander...Let us not forget, after all, there is ALWAYS a moment when moral choice is made....And so we must know these good people who helped the Jews during the Holocaust. We must learn from them, and in gratitude and hope, we must remember them." Elie Wiesel

The "One of the Righteous" Award was established by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne to convey the gratitude of the Jewish Community to non-Jews who, through word and deed, perpetuate the memory of the six million Jewish victims of the Holocaust.

The title, "One of the Righteous", is taken from Jewish tradition that describes non-Jews who helped the Jewish people in times of need.

This year's recipient has a long and distinguished career of ecumenical and inter-faith involvement. A career educator, he taught for 30 years in K-12 education before taking early retirement from R. Nelson Snider High School, Fort Wayne Community Schools in 2004. While at Snider, he chaired the social studies department and was named a Distinguished Teacher by the White House Commission on Presidential Scholars.

Upon leaving Snider, Dr. Lindquist joined the faculty at IPFW's School of Education and was a member of that faculty until his retirement in 2014. He was a founding codirector of the university's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies.

Dr. Lindquist has been associated with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum since he was named a Mandel Teacher Fellow in 1997. In addition, he was a member of the Museum's Regional Education Corps and continues to work on various programming implemented by the museum's education department.

He has been involved in teacher training about the Holocaust at local, state, national and international locations and studied the Holocaust at historical sites in the Netherlands, Germany, Poland, and the Czech Republic and at Yad Vashem and the Ghetto Fighters' House in Israel.

Dr. Lindquist has published more than 30 research articles, with the majority of them focusing on the theory and pedagogy of the Holocaust and genocide education. His Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction is from Indiana University-Bloomington, where his dissertation was titled – "Toward a Pedagogy of the Holocaust: Perspectives of Exemplary Teachers."

It is my high honor and joyful privilege to welcome to the lectern, my friend and "Mensch"....the 2019 Recipient of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne's "One of the Righteous" Award, Dr. David Lindquist...

How PJ Library Chooses Books

The <u>PJ Library</u> Book Selection Committee is hard at work year-round, finding the best books, beautiful illustrations, compelling stories and values to share with your children. They exemplify the best of Jewish children's literature. We are devoted to making book choices that represent the broad spectrum of today's Jewish families. Working with authors, agents, publishers, and editors, the committee strives to ensure that the finest Jewish books for children find their way each month into the mailboxes of all **PJ Library** families.

Many of our books have won prestigious awards, including the <u>Caldecott Medal</u> and the <u>Sydney Taylor Book Award</u>. Several have been named as finalists for the <u>National Jewish Book Award</u>.

Book Selection Guidelines

As the Book Selection Committee reviews books and manuscripts for PJ Library, it asks:

- Is this story suited for children between the ages of six months and eight years?
- Is the text (and illustrations, if available) engaging for young children and their parents?
- Is the content appropriate to the PJ Library mission? Does the book contain a message of strong Jewish values?
- Will children want to return to this book again and again?
- Does the book reflect historical Jewish life, contemporary Jewish life, or some valuable aspect of the Jewish experience?
- Will this book prompt family discussions about Jewish topics and lead families to consider making Jewish choices?

PJ Library is available to families who are raising Jewish children between the ages of 6 months and 8 years all across North America. They come from many backgrounds – some are intermarried, some have little or no formal Jewish learning, some attend a synagogue and celebrate Jewish holidays, and others may be unfamiliar with Jewish practice all together. We love that about **PJ Library**.

Due to the age of its participants, **PJ Library** does not send out reference books, books that deal with the Holocaust, or books that deal with the death or end-of-life of a loved one. **PJ Library** also does not send out workbooks or activity books as part of its regular monthly mailings.

RABBI PAULA JAYNE WINNIG

TEMPLE'S 23RD SPIRITUAL LEADER

Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig joins Congregation Achduth Vesholom in August as the Temple's 23rd spiritual leader and Interim Rabbi for the coming year.

She most recently served as the Executive Director of the Jewish Federation of Madison, Wisconsin. She was the Executive Director of the Bureau of Jewish Education in Indianapolis from 2011-2017.

Please join us when we welcome Rabbi Winnig at a lay-led service on Friday, August 2 at 6:15 p.m., followed by an Oneg Shabbat and opportunity to meet her. She'll lead her first service at the Temple the following week on Friday, August 9 at 6:15 p.m.

Rabbi Winnig served as the spiritual leader of congregations in Roslyn, Queens and Lawrence, New York after receiving her ordination from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 1986. She was a student rabbi at the Vista Del Mar Center, Los Angeles, CA and Congregation Beth Shalom in Auckland, New Zealand.

In 2016, Rabbi Winnig led High Holiday services for Congregation Adat Israel in Guatemala City. She was a prison chaplain for New York State for five years, serving in both the Women's maximum and medium security prisons in Bedford Hills, NY.

Rabbi Winnig was an adjunct lecturer in Biblical Hebrew at the Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. She received her MBA from the State University of New York, her Master of Arts of Hebrew Letters from HUC-JIR in Los Angeles, and her Bachelors' Degree with Honors in Political Science from the University of Wisconsin. She was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Divinity in Hebrew in May 2011 from the Hebrew Union College.

The Temple's Board of Directors selected Rabbi Winnig by a unanimous vote as Interim Rabbi following the recommendation of the 10-member Rabbinic Search Committee chaired by Fran Adler and Mike Rush. During the coming year, the search committee will continue to look for a settled rabbi for the Temple.

In recommending Rabbi Winnig to the board, the search committee members indicated that they found her to be warm, engaging, and energetic. They said she showed a genuine interest in our congregation and understands her role as an interim rabbi.

In 2010, Rabbi Winnig founded Torah Threads: Knitting the Threads of Torah into the Fabric of our Lives, a podcast currently on hiatus, celebrating her love of Torah, fiber arts and sustainable living.

Rabbi Winnig was a visiting graduate student in the Hebrew University Department of Talmud. She helped found and develop SULAM-LI: The Religious School for Jewish Children with Special Needs serving the Five Towns community of Long Island.

She has published many articles in both print and online media including a chapter in the book: *The Women's Haftarah Commentary*. She has appeared in many television programs and was a featured participant in the weekly cable television program "Father Tom and Friends" for three years.

A past co-chair of the Indiana Board of Rabbis, she served similar roles in New York area rabbinic and inter-faith organizations prior to her arrival in Indianapolis in 2011.

In 2015 Rabbi Winnig was named woman of the year by Unite magazine for her advocacy of equal rights for LGBTQ individuals in Indiana.

She is the proud mother of two adult sons, Karmi & Shai. Rabbi Winnig is also a fiber artist, cook and bicyclist.



HISTORIC DECISION BRINGS CONGREGATIONS TOGETHER

An exciting new chapter is beginning for Fort Wayne's Jewish community as Congregation Achduth Vesholom welcomes new members from Congregation B'nai Jacob following a landmark vote by the memberships to come together with two worship traditions.

Congregants from B'nai Jacob, a Conservative egalitarian synagogue, became members of Achduth Vesholom, a Reform congregation, on July 1. A plan with Reform services primarily on Friday night and traditional worship on Saturday morning was approved by members of both congregations at their respective annual meetings in May and June 2019. B'nai Jacob has sold its building on Bittersweet Moors Drive.

The newly-expanded Temple family includes **Rabbi Paula Jayne** Winnig, who begins August 1 as spiritual leader for the coming year. An Oneg Shabbat in her honor follows our Shabbat service on Friday, August 2 at 6:15 p.m. She'll lead her first service at

also will offer a new Shabbat led service, beginning

Saturday, August 10 at 9:15 a.m. All who have been attending this service at Congregation B'nai Jacob are invited to continue the tradition at the Rifkin Campus. If you haven't been before, we invite you to join us as we build k'hillah (community)!

While the Temple remains a Reform congregation in philosophy and practice, some traditional holiday services with quest clergy or lay leaders will be offered during the year, including Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. All services are open to the congregation and community.

A celebration of B'yachad (Together) and Simchat Torah is being

planned for Tuesday, October 22 with a festive meal at 6 p.m. before we dance together with the Torahs during the service at 7 p.m. With rabbinic transitions, shifting demographics, and changing membership patterns, both congregations decided the timing was right in August 2018 to begin conversations. An eight-member committee was formed and



developed a road map to strengthen the local Jewish community by consolidating into one congregation called Achduth Vesholom.

The B'yachad Committee members are: Ellen Tom (president), Larry Adelman, Ronnie Greenberg and Beth Zweig from Achduth Vesholom and Pam Friedman (president), Ron Friedman, Josh Tourkow, and Irene Walters from B'nai Jacob.

The Goldstine Chapel will be remodeled and will include both the Ark from B'nai Jacob and the stained glass windows from the Temple's previous building. The name will change to the Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel.

Yahrzeit plaques and Torahs are among the items that will be relocated to the Temple. Materials from B'nai Jacob's library will be added later in the summer to the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library and tagged as the "B'nai Jacob Collection" for future reference.

This time of transition offers a wonderful opportunity to expand friendships and try new Jewish experiences. We offer a full spectrum of worship, education, and other programming for the congregation and community.

- <u>The Garden of Letters</u> by Alyson Richman Tuesday, September 24 - At one time a selection of the <u>Jewish</u> <u>Book Council's Book Club</u>, this novel follows the story of Elodie, a Jewish cellist arriving in Italy in 1943. The author is particularly keen to share her experience of researching this novel with us.
- <u>Windy City Blues</u> by Renee Rosen Tuesday, January 14 - Set in the 1950s and 60s in Chicago, the novel showcases the relationship between Jewish record company owners and African American blues artists. Leeba Groski, an Orthodox Jewish songwriter, is a woman caught in the middle of these two communities.
- Tasa's Song: A Novel by Linda Kass Tuesday, March 3 - Inspired by true events, the novel follows Tasa, a young Polish violinist, caught in World War II between the Nazis and the Soviet Union. From Publishers Weekly, it is "a memorable tale of unflinching courage in the face of war—and the power of love and beauty to flourish amid its horrors."
