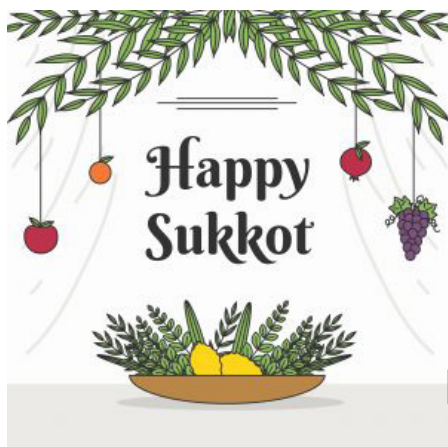

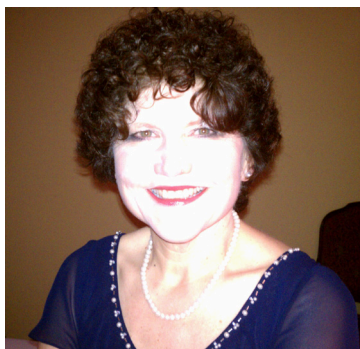

JCPA Mourns the Loss of Ruth Bader Ginsburg



The Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA) mourns the death of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. She was a true hero and a champion of justice and equality.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg rose from the humble beginnings of an immigrant Jewish family in Flatbush to become a Supreme Court Justice. As a lawyer and advocate, she fought to change laws and policies that advanced reproductive rights and equality for all.

As a Supreme Court Justice, she upheld many of the positions central to JCPA's mission. "To make life a little better for people less fortunate than you, that's what I think a meaningful life is," she explained.

In 2002, Ginsburg received JCPA's Albert D. Chernin Award, which recognizes individuals whose life work best exemplifies the social justice imperatives of Judaism and the protection of the Bill of Rights, particularly the First Amendment.

"The best way to honor Justice Ginsburg's life is to continue to fight for equality and to deter the rollback of women's reproductive rights," stated David Bernstein, JCPA's President and CEO. "Her work and legacy live on in our work."

THE JEWISH FEDERATIONS OF NORTH AMERICA WELCOME THE SIGNING OF THE ABRAHAM ACCORDS

On September 15, the Jewish Federations of North America's chair of the Board of Trustees Mark Wilf and President and CEO Eric Fingerhut joined nearly 1,000 guests on the White House Lawn to witness the historic signing of the peace accords between Israel and the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain. Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu met with U.S. President Donald Trump prior to the ceremony, followed by a four-way meeting between Trump, Netanyahu and the foreign ministers of the UAE and Bahrain, Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan and Abdullatif bin Rashid Al Zayani, who are signed the accords for their countries.

"We welcome the signing of the Abraham Accords. We hope and expect that this agreement will expand Israel's ability to live in peace with its neighbors, a development Israel has long sought," said Mark Wilf, chair of the Board of Trustees of The Jewish Federations of North America.

"President Trump and his team have made regional peace a priority and deserve much credit for this historic accomplishment. We are pleased to be at the White House today to witness the signing of the Abraham Accords," said Eric Fingerhut, President and CEO of The Jewish Federations of North America.

What is Simchat Torah?

The autumn months are full of Jewish holidays: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Sukkot! But did you know that there are more holidays that take place during these joy-filled weeks?



One of these holidays is *Simchat Torah*, which means "rejoicing of the Torah" in Hebrew. This day is the exuberant conclusion to the fall holiday season in the Jewish calendar. It is an unforgettable outpouring of joy and celebration, all about one thing: the Torah, the first five books of the Bible.

What Happens on Simchat Torah?

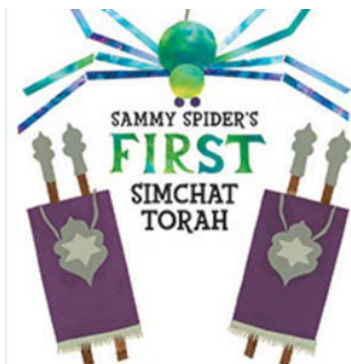
On Simchat Torah, the Torah scrolls are taken out in synagogues all over the world, and the singing and dancing begins! The celebration includes a reading of the final portion in the Torah. When reading the Torah is completed, it is immediately begun again. The first chapters of the book of Genesis are read aloud, kicking off a new yearly Torah cycle. One of the highlights of the service is when the children present are called up for an *aliyah*, the blessing that precedes a Torah reading.

How Do People Celebrate?

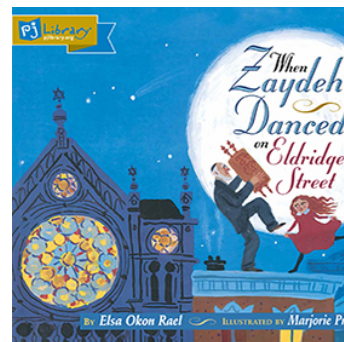

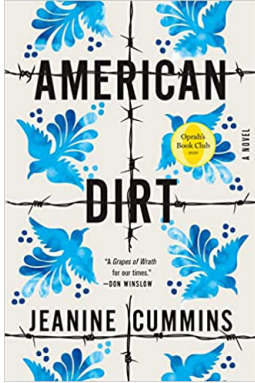
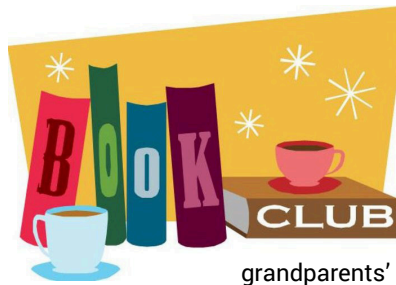

"AMERICAN DIRT"

A novel by Jeanine Cummins

This novel, published in January of 2020, begins with this intro:

"FEAR KEEPS THEM RUNNING
HOPE KEEPS THEM ALIVE
YESTERDAY LYDIA HAD A
BOOKSHOP
YESTERDAY LYDIA WAS MARRIED
TO A JOURNALIST
YESTERDAY SHE WAS WITH
EVERYONE SHE LOVED MOST IN THE
WORLD
TODAY, HER 8 YEAR OLD SON IS ALL SHE HAS LEFT
FOR HIM, SHE WILL CARRY A MACHETE STRAPPED TO HER
LEG
FOR HIM, SHE WILL LEAP ONTO THE ROOF OF A
HIGH SPEED TRAIN
FOR HIM, SHE WILL FIND THE STRENGTH TO KEEP
RUNNING"

AMERICAN DIRT opens with the sudden, violent intrusion of an unthinkable event; the cold-blooded execution of an entire Mexican family including a father, grandparents, and cousins – 16 innocent members of Lydia Perez's family. The reason for the execution was retaliation.

Lydia Perez is a Mexican middle-class mother of an 8 year old boy named Luca, and the wife of a journalist, Sebastian. In addition to running the household, Lydia owns a bookstore in Acapulco, where she and her family live. Javier, the kingpin of a newly organized cartel becomes a regular customer. Lydia and Javier become good friends by way of their mutual love of books. He is erudite, charming, and very attractive. The writing suggests that he is physically attracted to Lydia. She does not know that he is a ruthless killer.

In 1917, the murder rate for journalists in Mexico had grown to be the highest it had ever been. Sebastian, unaware of his wife's friendship with Javier, publishes an expose of the cartel. In response to the expose, Javier orders an execution of the entire family. The massacre occurs during a family gathering at the

grandparents' home. This is the catalyst for the rest of the story. Luca and his mother escape execution by hiding in the bathroom. (I defy anyone to read these initial pages and not continue to read the rest of the novel.) I was hooked and I couldn't turn the pages fast enough.

The remainder of the novel records Lydia and Luca's journey north to the United States. This account really opened my eyes to the difficulties the migrants face both physically and emotionally. Meeting other migrants facing horrors in their homeland, learning of the disturbing motives of many Coyotes, and of the dangers of traveling through the desert to the border, made me take another look at how I feel about migrants crossing into the U.S.

American Dirt was advanced as an Oprah book and has been hailed as the next Grapes of Wrath. However, along with the accolades, there is much controversy associated with this novel. The critics center their criticism around the author's own credentials and her purpose for writing this novel. Jeanine Cummins faces accusations of not being Mexican, not having lived in Mexico, and not having the experiences of the many Mexicans crossing the border. Ms. Cummins herself had stated that she wished "someone with skin more brown than hers" had written of the plight of the migrants. However, the author counters much of the criticism by describing her 4 years of being involved in the writing process, including extensive travel in Mexico and interviews with real people living in Mexico. I encourage everyone to read this controversial novel and make their own decisions.

Jeanine Cummins is married to an immigrant, who was undocumented at the time that they met. It took him 5 years to propose because he wanted his green card before he proposed. She is a United States citizen who comes from a family of mixed cultures and ethnicities. Her grandmother is from Puerto Rico. Ms. Cummins has written 3 previous novels: The Outside Boy, The Crooked Branch, and A Rip in Heaven. American Dirt is her most recent novel. It is an excellent read and I highly recommend it.

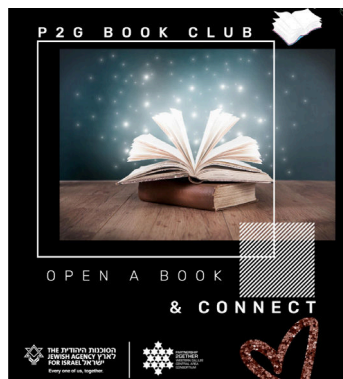

FALL IS PHOTO FOCUSED

Members of the Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society met with the ACPL Genealogy Center’s Kay Spears to discuss photographs at their first virtual “Lunch and Learn” last month. We discussed best practices for digitizing and storing photographs and touched on photo editing and manipulation. We spent some time analyzing two member pictures as well. NEIJGS holds two informal “Lunch and Learn” programs each year which are informal gatherings for sharing information and asking questions.

At 2:00 that afternoon, she will present “No Language Barrier: Immigrant Clues in Photographs.” From her website, “Family historians often overlook the ethnic evidence sitting in their photo albums. COVID - 19

How to Select, Wear, and Clean Your Mask



CDC has updated its mask-wearing guidance. CDC recommends that you wear [masks](#) in public settings around people who don't live in your household and when you can't stay 6 feet away from others. Masks help stop the spread of COVID-19 to others.

Overview

- Wear masks with two or more layers to stop the spread of COVID-19
- Wear the mask over your nose and mouth and secure it under your chin
- Masks should be worn by people two years and older
- Masks should NOT be worn by children younger than two, people who have trouble breathing, or people who cannot remove the mask without assistance
- Do NOT wear masks intended for healthcare workers, for example, N95 respirators

How to Select

When selecting a mask, there are many choices. Here are some dos and don'ts.

DO choose masks that	DO NOT choose masks that
 Have two or more layers of washable, breathable fabric	 Are made of fabric that makes it hard to breathe, for example, vinyl
 Completely cover your nose and mouth	 Have exhalation valves or vents, which allow virus particles to escape
 Fit snugly against the sides of your face and don't have gaps	 Are intended for healthcare workers, including N95 respirators or surgical masks

How to Wear

Do wear a mask that:

- Covers your nose and mouth and secure it under your chin
- Fits snugly against the sides of your face



How to Clean

Masks should be washed regularly. Always [remove masks correctly](#) and [wash your hands](#) after handling or touching a used mask.

- Include your mask with your regular laundry
- Use regular laundry detergent and the warmest appropriate water setting for the cloth used to make the mask
- Use the highest heat setting and leave in the dryer until completely dry

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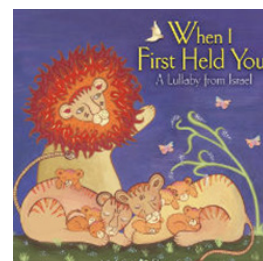
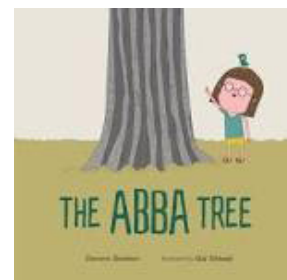

A program of the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, PJ Library is made possible through partnerships with philanthropists and local Jewish organizations. Families with kids ages 6 months through 8 years old with Judaism as part of their lives are welcome to sign up.



PJ Our Way is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored experience based on their own interests and reading level. To make the choice easier, our website includes summaries and author bios, along with ratings, reviews, and video trailers created by members themselves. Kids can also take polls and quizzes, participate in monthly interviews and challenges, post their own reviews, and comment on blog posts.
