# JOURNAL GAZETTE OP ED WRITTEN BY RABBI MEIR BARGERON AND JAKI SCHREIER MAY 18, 2021



The State of Israel and Hamas are engaged in the most intense military conflict in seven years. Missiles fly out of Gaza to targets in Israel. Most of these are intercepted by the Iron Dome missile defense system, but not all of them. Some of them land on people's houses, and innocent people die. Then missiles fly out of Israel into Gaza. Many more



of these reach their targets, and many more people, innocent civilians as well as combatants, die. This time, the missile conflict has been accompanied by fighting on the streets of mixed Arab and Jewish cities in Israel. In short, it is another catastrophic situation in the Holy Land.

Our hearts are breaking because innocent civilians, Jewish and Arab, inside Israel and in Gaza are suffering. Children are sleeping in bomb shelters. The people of Gaza are being held captive by Hamas, a terrorist organization that has little regard for the wellbeing of the Palestinians within its borders; Hamas thinks nothing of sacrificing Palestinian lives in its drive to kill Jews. Our hearts are breaking because it shouldn't be this way...and yet, it is difficult to imagine things ever being different. Perhaps this is the greatest tragedy of all. As it is written in the book of Lamentations, "For these things [we] weep, [our] eyes flow with tears" (1:16).

As American Jews with personal and spiritual ties to Israel, we are horrified to see continued violence in the State of Israel and the Palestinian territories. We support Israel's right to defend its citizens against rockets and acts of terror — which we unequivocally condemn. We pray that this conflict is quickly ended with a cease fire honored by all parties involved. And then, we call on the government of Israel to engage fully in a negotiated resolution agreed to by Israelis and Palestinians that can meet the legitimate needs and aspirations of both peoples. We also call on the U.S. government to make addressing the Israeli-Palestinian conflict a priority once again.

We hope and dream for a time of peace in the Holy Land. We envision a time when Israelis and Palestinians can sleep safely in their beds every night. We yearn for the day when the children of Israel, Gaza and the West Bank can know one another in laughter and friendship, without the burden, and without the shackles of fear and hate.

# **Great Summer Reading Tips**

Summer is in full swing. With camp, the beach, playdates, and the great outdoors calling, it can be easy to let good reading habits slip. We're happy to tell you that it's easy to integrate reading and stories into your everyday summer schedule.

Whether you're slipping books into the beach bag or taking advantage of the public library's free air conditioning, there are many ways to make sure your family keeps reading all summer long. Here are our tried and true summer reading tips:

#### Take books with you



Toss books in your beach bag, your vacation carry-on, or in the stroller. On hot days at the park, encourage your

child to take a minute enjoying some shade with a book of their choice. If you're packing for a vacation, make a big deal out of selecting a special "vacation read" together with your child.

#### Read aloud together

Studies show that children whose parents read aloud to them have a leg up on literacy and reading



comprehension. Feel free to read aloud to children of all ages--make silly voices, take turns, stop to answer questions your child might ask. You'll have fun and you'll be increasing your child's vocabulary while cementing a love of reading and stories.

#### Go to the library

Local libraries often offer cheap or free children's programming throughout the



summer. Hit up a program at your library, or take a break from the summer heat to visit the children's section. If your child is old

enough, sign them up for their very own library card. Encourage your child to make their own selections at the library from the varied media available such as books, CDs, DVDs, and games.

## The Four Winds by Kristin Hannah





Once I learned that Kristin Hannah's newest book, "Four Winds" was being released on February 2nd, I contacted the Allen County Public Library to

be put on the 'waitlist'. The book was so popular that it wasn't available for me to check out for two months. The wait was definitely worthwhile.

This Depression-era historical fiction story is completely relevant to our current situation with the pandemic and climate change. It's eerie how history does tend to repeat itself in various ways.

The book begins in 1921 rural Texas. It is a time of abundance. The Great War is over, the bounty of the land is plentiful and the United States is on the brink of a new and optimistic era. However, for the main character, Elsa, at 25, deemed too old to marry and unattractive in a time when marriage is a woman's only option, the future seems bleak. The story starts off with Elsa feeling very isolated at her family home. A heart condition has crippled her parents' perspective of her so they don't believe that she'll accomplish anything, force her to drop out of school, which she loves, and literally banish her to her room and her books. Her future changes the night she meets a young man.

When the charming and naive Rafe Martinelli shows an interest in Elsa, everything changes from that point forward. She gets pregnant with her daughter, Loreda (another main character is this story). Rafe is forced to give up his parents' dream of him going to college, while Elsa is banished from her home forever. She moves to the Martinelli farm and is embraced and loved by Rafe's parents.

While Elsa and Rafe's marriage is far from a dream, Elsa finds her place at the farm. When times are good, it's great. All Elsa wants is love and to be loved in return, but she doesn't get that from her husband, and when Loreda becomes a teenager, she resents everything her mother represents. Loreda is biased towards her dreamer father not her hard-working, practical mother. She believes there is so much more

out there than the farm life and feels suffocated.

By 1934, the world has changed: millions are out of work and drought has devastated the Great Plains. Farmers fight to keep their land, their livelihoods and way of life as crops fail and water dries up and the earth cracks open. Dust storms roll relentlessly across the plains. Everything on the Martinelli farm is dying, including Elsa's marriage. Each day is a desperate battle against nature and a fight to keep her children alive.

In this most perilous time, Elsa must make the agonizing choice, like so many of her neighbors are doing: fight for the land she loves or leave it behind and go to California, in search of a better, healthier life for her family.

Rafe abandons the family on the dying farm, devastating his wife, children and parents. Elsa's son, Anthony, becomes so sick as a result of the continuous dust storms that it becomes apparent that Elsa must make her way to California. The trip is perilous and dangerous.

Once in California, Elsa and her children live in camps and try to find work whenever they can. California is far from the golden state that they dreamed it would be. Elsa insists her children enroll in school as she knows that education opens up worlds that were denied to her. They and the other migrant workers are discriminated against by California locals who refer to them in the slang term "Okies." It is heart-wrenching to read the cruelty toward those who were fleeing the broken farms for a better life.

Eventually, Elsa gets involved with a movement to improve the lives of migrant workers. Her strength and resilience throughout all aspects of this story is inspiring and impactful.

This story had everything I could want in a historical fiction novel. It's full of heart and survival of a family struggling through the difficulties of poverty and famine during the Dust Bowl in the years after the Great Depression.

A SURGEON'S VIEW OF WORLD WAR II IN PATTON'S THIRD ARMY Through photos and commentary, Thomas H. Brush will share the fascinating story of his father on Monday, June 14 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. via Zoom in "A Surgeon's View of World War II in Patton's Third Army: The Story of John H. Brush, M.D." The program is sponsored by the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee.

A surgeon in a mobile auxiliary surgical group during World War II, Dr. John Brush experienced the liberation of Paris, the Battle of the Bulge, the attack on the Siegfried Line, the crossing of the Rhine, and the liberation of Ebensee Concentration Camp, a satellite of Mauthausen.

"While for me this is a chance for a personal tribute to my father, in the process we see these events through the eyes of one

soldier, and I hope gain a more human perspective on them," said Dr. Thomas Brush.

Dr. Brush is a Professor of Management at the Krannert School of Management at Purdue University. His research focuses on corporate strategy and manufacturing strategy topics such as acquisitions, diversification, manufacturing capability exploitation within companies, and supplier relationships.


