



FORT WAYNE HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE

The emergency funding will focus on:

- Helping people make Aliyah to Israel.
- Securing the local community and its institutions.
- Maintaining critical welfare services.
- Launching an emergency hotline
- Securing temporary housing for people in transit.
- Purchasing satellite phones to maintain communications across the region.
- Securing five Jewish schools and training staff to manage crisis needs.

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne has secured a dollar to dollar match up to \$10,000.00 to make our community's contribution more impactful.

It is because we're always there, day after day, year after year, that we can deliver hope and help now when it is so desperately needed!

Our Ukrainian brothers and sisters are counting on you. Will you be there?

Whenever and wherever one Jew is threatened, we are all threatened. We remain vigilant in these troubling times and, on behalf of our cousins in the region, we extend our deep gratitude for your generosity and compassion.





What are we talking about this month: Teaching Kids to Say the Four Questions



Traditionally recited at the Seder by the youngest child present, the Four Questions, or *Mah Nishtanah* in Hebrew, ask about certain Passover rituals. Each question and its answer is printed below followed by fun videos your family can use to practice the Four Questions--and their answers--with your children. You'll also find tips for children who may be a little bit nervous about being in the spotlight.

Since asking questions is a key part of what makes the seder so special, don't be shy about asking your own questions about Passover and seeking out answers with your kids as well.

The Four Questions

All four questions help answer one big question: Why is this night unlike all others?

On all other nights we eat either leavened or unleavened bread. On this night, why do we eat only unleavened matzah? *Answer*: To remind us of the haste with which our ancestors left Egypt.

On all other nights we eat all kinds of herbs. On this night, why only bitter herbs? *Answer*: To remind us of the bitterness of slavery.

On all other nights we do not dip our herbs even once. On this night, why do we dip them twice? *Answer*: Some say to remind us of our coming and going from Egypt.

On all other nights we eat sometimes sitting and sometimes reclining. On this night, why do we all recline? *Answer*: To remind us of how free people relax.

- 4. Draw the Four Questions instead of reciting them

NEED HELP FINDING YOUR ANCESTRAL TOWN?



The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is excited to welcome genealogist and mathematician Ed Mitukiewicz for a free virtual program on Sunday, April 3rd, beginning at 2:00 p.m. "Location, Location, Location: How Genealogical Research Can Benefit From Historical Maps" is the focus of the afternoon's presentation. Identifying the towns and villages where our ancestors used to live can be a critical step in finding relevant sources of genealogical information. However, locating some of those places often becomes quite a challenging task, particularly in Central and Eastern Europe, where use of multiple languages, spelling or transliteration errors, appearance of similar names in different locations and countries, frequent name changes and shifting national borders introduce additional complications. Readily available web-based resources—including digital repositories of

historical maps and geographic information databases—can help to overcome many of those challenges. This presentation demonstrates the methods and techniques of using such resources to facilitate locating ancestral towns in Central and Eastern Europe.

FamilySearch.org is a massive *free* online genealogical resource maintained by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons). It contains huge amounts of records that the church has filmed and digitized from around the world. Much is indexed, but probably even more is not yet searchable, so learning how to take advantage of these resources is important. Todd Knowles, from the Family History Library, will be the NEIJGS speaker on May 1st, *live and in person* at the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center! At 2:00 that afternoon, he will speak about how to use FamilySearch and how it works, and at 3:30, he'll delve into the huge number of Jewish records available and what is to come. 


Help is Available




Which books did you receive this month?














<u>PJ Our Way</u> is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored
