part of the Northeast Indiana community for 101 years!



In 1921, we, the Jewish people of Fort Wayne came together to help resettle immigrants from Europe who were moving here to escape persecution and seeking to rebuild their lives, thus changing their futures and those of their descendants. We were there to help during the Depression of the 1930s, when members of our community were suffering financial hardships. We were there to help resettle survivors of the Holocaust. We worked together to raise funds for the establishment of the Jewish Homeland, Israel. We came together in 1967 and 1973 to assist Israel when her very existence was under threat. We worked together to help Russian Jews resettle in Fort Wayne. We continue to come to the aid of those in need whenever we are called upon in our own community, in Israel and around

the world. We were there then and will be here in the future.

And this is just a fraction of the many services, educational programming and pursuit for Social Justice that the JFFW has been up to since 1921.

On May 21, 2022, we will come together to celebrate our 100th anniversary. We encourage you to share in this special Simcha with us. We will begin the evening with Havdalah, share delicious food, Israeli wine, entertainment, music, schmoozing, and premier a 12-minute "Sizzle Reel" taken from the feature length documentary of our history that is currently being edited for later showing.

What are we talking about this month:

The Lag B'Omer Lowdown: History & Activities

In Jewish tradition, we count the 49 days between the second night of Passover and the



beginning of <u>Shavuot</u>. This is called *S'firat Ha'Omer* ("The Counting of the Omer"). On the 33rd day of counting, we celebrate the holiday of *Lag B'Omer*, which begins at sundown on May 18.

"Lag" is an abbreviated combination of two Hebrew letters that, according to Hebrew numerology, add up to the number 33.

ABOUT LAG B'OMER

Lag B'Omer is traditionally celebrated with great joy. Jewish sources offer a range of opinions as to the origins of this joy.

The Talmud says Lag B'Omer celebrates the halt of a plague that took the lives of thousands of students of the great teacher Rabbi Akiva. Other sources say Lag B'Omer celebrates a victory for the armies of the Jewish

leader Bar Kochba. Some associate Lag B'Omer with stories about Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai, a student of Rabbi Akiva and writer of an important Jewish text.

CELEBRATING THE 33rd DAY

A number of traditions and customs have developed around the holiday of *Lag B'Omer*. In Israel and beyond, for example, many families light bonfires to brighten up cities and countryside alike. In addition, many Jewish couples schedule weddings and parties on Lag B'Omer. Interested in celebrating *Lag B'Omer* this year? Try one of these fun activities:

Build a Campfire

Lag B'Omer falls in mid-to-late spring, making it a great time to break out the camping gear — or at least light a fire in a fire pit. Don't forget to make some <u>delicious s'mores!</u>

Pull Out the Bows & Arrows

Israeli children typically play with bows and (suction-cup-tipped) arrows on *Lag B'Omer*, imitating students of Rabbis Akiva and Shimon who fooled the Romans by pretending they were hunting. Relay races are another fun holiday activity.

Put on a Parade

Some communities stage parades for *Lag B'Omer*. Your family can organize a parade of its own. March around the block or just around the house and yard.

Get a Haircut

Yes, a haircut! The Counting of the *Omer* is treated as a semi-mourning period, and observant Jews refrain from haircutting during such a time. Because *Lag B'Omer* suspends that restriction, it is a traditional time for young children to get their first haircuts.

LEARN ABOUT FAMILYSEARCH ON MAY 1st

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society hosted over 130 guests from around the world for a virtual presentation in April about historical maps by genealogist Ed Mitukiewicz. He provided an excellent seminar on the use of maps in genealogical research, particularly in determining locations of ancestral towns in Eastern Europe. NEIJGS members attended an additional workshop with Mr. Mitukiewicz following the public session.

On May 1st, the NEIJGS is thrilled to host genealogist Todd Knowles, from the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, for a presentation in-person at the ACPL Genealogy Center. FamilySearch is an amazing source of original records for Jewish genealogical research. At 2:00, he will begin with "How to Use FamilySearch," an introduction to the website, how to use it and how records are obtained for the site. At 3:30, he'll focus on "Using FamilySearch for Jewish Research." In addition to presenting what's currently available, he'll touch on what's new and what's coming soon to the website.

Todd Knowles, AG® is an Accredited Genealogist who currently serves as a Deputy Chief Genealogical Officer for the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Todd has lectured all over the world and his articles have been widely



published. His own genealogical search began at the age of twelve with the desire to find more about his family. His quest to find more about his great-great-grandfather, a Polish Jew, has led to the creation of the Knowles Collection, six databases that contain the records of the Jewish people. It currently contains the records of over 1.5 million people.



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
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




Which books did you receive this month?














PJ Our Way is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored
