#### THE JEWISH FEDERATION OF FORT WAYNE RAISES \$30,000 FOR UKRAINE AID

On February 24, 2022, the world watched in shock and horror as Russia invaded the sovereign state of Ukraine. The Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA) immediately began an emergency campaign to raise the desperately needed funds to assist



displaced Ukrainian Jews and others.

JFNA allocated funds to over forty six NGO's that operate on the ground in Ukraine and neighboring countries, including core partner agencies such as The Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), and World Ort. Distributions of funds have focused on humanitarian aid and rescue operations, trauma relief and medical care, refugee resettlement and Aliyah and absorption in Israel. Allocations also went toward organizations such as Hadassah for medical delegations and trauma units, the Israel Trauma Coalition for trauma relief, and Nefesh B'Nefesh for immigrant absorption. In 2021 alone, the Jewish Federations and Network of Independent Communities raised and allocated over \$100 million in unrestricted funds for our three partner organizations to power their vital work protecting Jews around the world, caring for the neediest among our people wherever they live, and connecting our communities.

Jewish Federations are uniquely positioned to respond immediately and effectively to this crisis due to their long presence in the region that supports partners in the Ukraine and neighboring countries, coupled with their vast reach across North American Jewish communities and decade's long experience in fundraising for global crises. JFNA invests over \$100 million annually in core, unrestricted funding to their partners to ensure that they have the infrastructure to support vulnerable Jewish communities and to respond to emergencies that arise. Funds are also used to support the Federations' creation of a first-of-its-kind central volunteer hub to provide these much needed services. Russian speaking volunteers were deployed to Budapest, Warsaw and the Ukraine border. In addition, JFNA is successfully advocating for expanded refugee rights and resettlement, thus building on a long history of activism in the refugee space.

JFNA President and CEO, Eric Fingerhut said, "There are moments in time when humanity is called upon to take action to shape history. We are living in one of those times and I am so proud to know that the Jewish community is at the forefront of these efforts."

The **Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne** answered the call to take action and make a positive impact. **Larry Adelman**, on behalf of the Board, reached out to the **Goldenberg and Ruchman families** requesting their permission to allocate monies from their family funds to be used as a fundraising match for our local campaign. Thankfully, we were given their blessing. Our community members responded allowing our small Federation to send \$30.000 to **JFNA** for use of Ukrainian relief.

We thank you for your commitment and generosity on behalf of those whose lives have been saved because you answered the call.





# **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANNUAL MEETING SPEECH - JUNE 12, 2022**

Shalom - welcome to the 101st Annual Meeting of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

After two years of holding our meeting virtually, it is truly a blessing to be here in person and to speak about the accomplishments of the Federation.

On behalf of the Federation's Board of Directors, I thank each and every one of you. Your continued support, both financially and by your active participation, allows the Federation to continue to plant the seeds necessary for our renaissance and renewal.

We may be small in number, but to quote Mahatma Gandhi - "In a gentle way, you can shake the world." We do this by being a vital presence and consistent voice for good in our community and the world.

At this time, I would like to reflect on just a few of the things we have accomplished since we last met.

The Federation, along with Congregation Achduth Vesholom came together to raise a substantial amount of funds to assist with Catholic Charities resettlement of Afghan refugees forced to flee their homeland. Rabbi Meir and I were able to get a first hand account of the amazing work that goes into helping these new citizens rebuild their lives and to become valuable contributors to our society.

When Russia invaded the Ukraine, the Jewish Federations of North America came together to raise the funding needed to relocate Jews and other displaced refugees fleeing for their lives to Israel and to European countries who would open their doors. Our own Federation joined this call to action and raised \$30,000 for this effort.

As a people, through our history, Jews know what it is to be a stranger in a strange land. Thus, we fully believed that we absolutely needed to respond...and we did!

To fulfill our mission statement which is, "to support the well being and continuity of the Jewish people in Greater Fort Wayne, in Israel, and throughout the world", we provided funds to other small federations whose communities were experiencing tragedies such as natural disasters or anti-Semitic actions.

We provided vital support for the annual event commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's 1963 visit to Fort Wayne. While he was here, Dr. King wrote portions of his "I Have a Dream" speech. This event, spearheaded by Rev. Bill McGill, continues Dr. King's legacy for justice for all citizens. And to summarize a statement made by Benjamin Franklin, "No man is free until all men are free."

When COVID-19 forced the closure of Camp Joe Levine in 2020, we came back last year with the maximum number of campers

who could safely participate. We anticipate 2022 to be a banner year, due in part to the scholarships we're able to provide, thanks to the generosity of the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation and the Janet Finkel Campership Fund. For many children, this is the only opportunity they have to experience a fun and educational outdoor camping experience, with its core being faithful to Jewish values.

We owe much to the Camp Directors, Larisa Drozdova and Sam McGlennen for creating such a great adventure for these young people. We appreciate Rabbi Meir for leading Shabbat at the end of each week, which is always a highlight.

Thanks to the Janet Finkel Campership Fund, the Federation is able to provide financial assistance for away camp, such as GUCI in Zionsville.

Due in part to the generosity of the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation, area children can participate in the PJ Library book program and events, free of charge. From this, the Federation and Congregation Achduth Vesholom have joined together to create an annual "Havdalah under the Stars" program for young families.

Bonnie Pomerantz and I have stepped up the number of Shabbat and holiday bags that we deliver to members and good friends of the Federation - in an effort to stay connected to our members.

We continue to partner with our friends at Public Television PBS39 to air a number of highly regarded documentaries. Just as COVID has affected all of us, it has impacted the number of our events and activities. Most recently, we taped our Yom HaShoah service and aired it on PBS.

Due to the wonder of Zoom, Dr. David Lindquist led our popular and highly respected "Confronting the Shoah" course. Our hope is that the pandemic will remain contained enough for this course to meet in person, January of 2023.

This year, the Rosh Chodesh Committee hosted "Pesach Cooking with Eileen Goltz" and an informational tour and history of Lindenwood Cemetery.

Thanks to the generosity of our members, we were able to provide for many in need. We allocated funds to many Jewish agencies, including Jewish Studies Programs and Hillel's in Indiana. We primarily allocate to the Jewish Federations of North America for the amazing work they do globally.

During the past year, Sara Fiedelholtz and I spent countless hours working with a professional videographer, interviewing, documenting and recording over 54 amazing stories. The goal was to capture Jewish life in the Fort Wayne community, as part of the 100th commemoration of the Federation. These interviews are currently in the process of becoming a full documentary to be shown as a special event, hopefully in the fall.

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## PRESIDENT ANNUAL MEETING SPEECH - JUNE 12, 2022

I have it on excellent authority that listening to me talk is not a motivating factor for anyone attending this meeting. With that in mind, I will attempt to be focused.

We recently celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Fort Wayne Jewish Federation, truly a milestone, for any organization, although the global pandemic caused this event to be delayed for more than a year. As a result of that same concern we had not been able to program in the ways we have typically done. Despite all impediments, however, the Federation has persevered in accomplishing its multifaceted mission. This is a testament to the spirit and engagement of the board, its members, volunteers, and especially Jaki and Bonnie.

Our Executive Director and Office Manger go well beyond the "part time" positions for which they are employed. What I view on a daily basis is the commitment, and tireless effort directed toward and reflected in everything the Federation does. We are fortunate to have them making all that transpires in our name happen, and for a great deal of the continued respect the organization has in the larger Fort Wayne community.

As an organization committed to support the well-being and continuity of the Jewish people in Fort Wayne, in Israel, and throughout the world, and proceeding with the vision that all Jewish people of greater Fort Wayne will find social, cultural, and educational relevancy to their Jewish lives as well as make all Jews feel welcome, I believe we can legitimately acknowledge success again this year. I will not belabor the myriad accomplishments.

The organization is sound, focused and, I believe, up to the current and growing challenges to which the Jewish community, in this country as well around the world is subjected. Anti-Semitism and violence has increased in a way, unfortunately, I would not have considered possible as I grew up in this community and for the greatest share of my adult life.

The Federation is, as part of the National Organization, monitoring, preparing, and responding. We continue to forge partnerships with other organizations that share our values and commitments to social justice, economic equality, inclusiveness, and strengthening our belief that our children are our future.

That brings me to what I consider to be a significant communal responsibility. Currently, as an organization, we are able to accomplish our mission to the extent we do, because those who came before us, our grandparents and parents, whose lives were more directly confronted by discrimination, bigotry, and violence, payed it forward. They did so by endowing future generations with their largess. Our community, unfortunately, is not growing in the ways that it has previously. Where once, two vibrant congregations both filled their religious schools, we now have one congregation that has fewer students than either congregation only a generation ago. Fewer Jews are affiliating, and, yet I suspect, there will remain a Jewish presence in the Fort Wayne area. I believe it paramount that the Jewish community have a strong voice as an advocate to address their perspectives as well as provide support for their needs and cultural heritage. As I observe our community numbers shrinking and the membership aging, it is likely to be more difficult to meet future needs in the fashion we do now without all of us following the example of those who preceded us. That is by committing to endow the organization for the benefit and viability of the generations that follow.



#### What are we talking about this month:

### Children's Books to Help Observe Tisha B'Av



Not all Jewish holidays are joyous. Some are somber and can be a challenge for parents to discuss with children. Such is the case with Tisha B'Av and the Three Weeks.

#### WHAT IS TISHA B'AV?

Tisha B'Av occurs on the ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av. It usually falls between mid-July and mid-August. It is a holiday of sadness and mourning that commemorates the destruction of First and Second Temples in Jerusalem in 586 BCE and 70 CE, respectively.

#### SOLOMON'S TEMPLE

The Holy Temple was a magnificent temple, built by King Solomon in Jerusalem over 3,000 years ago. King Solomon, also known as Shlomo, was one of the wisest leaders of Israel in ancient times. Known in Hebrew as the Beit HaMikdash, this Temple was the center and magnetic core of Jewish life at that time. The Temple was destroyed in the year 70 CE by the Romans, constituting one of the most monumental events in Jewish history. Since this time, Jews have commemorated the Destruction of the Temple with a day of mourning and fasting.

#### TEACHING KIDS ABOUT ANCIENT ISRAEL

The mature themes of Tisha B'Av can present a challenge for parents looking for age-appropriate lessons for children. For early readers, a good starting point in learning about Tisha B'Av and the Three Weeks might be ancient Israel.

There are a number of PJ Library books can help paint a picture in children's minds about what life was like during ancient times, prior to the destruction of the temple. Below is a list of PJ Library books that reflect the era of Solomon and showcase what society was like around the time the first Temple was built. 






#### **GENEALOGY SOCIETY ANNOUNCES 2022-2023 PROGRAMS**

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society recently announced its line-up of programs for 2022-2023 at its virtual Annual Meeting in May. A new slate of officers and Board of Directors was also elected for the coming year. Betsy Thal Gephart will serve as president, Pam Friedman as vice-president Beth Zweig as secretary, and Irv Adler as treasurer. Other board members will include Samara Sheray, Curt Witcher, and Bruce Colegrove.

For next season, five free public programs will be offered, both live and virtually. On September 11, 2022, the NEIJGS will begin with its annual "Meet Your Mishpocha" Open House at Congregation Achduth Vesholom. A variety of resources will be available for Jewish genealogical research and local Jewish history.

The first guest speaker will be Marian Smith, speaking on "The Increasingly Accessible US Immigration and Naturalization Correspondence Files" on Sunday, November 13th. Marian served for thirty years as an historian for the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), later US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), and has lots of information to share about late 19th and 20th century immigration records.

For February of 2023, Dr. Nicholas J. Evans will present three virtual programs on consecutive Tuesday afternoons. Hosted in conjunction with the ACPL Genealogy Center, the presentations will track the journey of Eastern European emigrants from their homes to the United States and elsewhere. Nick will begin on Tuesday, February 7th at 2:30 p.m. with a program about the journey of Eastern European immigrants from their homes to ports of emigration. The following Tuesday's program will focus on the overseas journey and the ports of arrival, mainly, but not exclusively, in the United States. And the third

program will cover the immigrant's experience in this country. Dr. Evans is a senior lecturer at the University of Hull in England, where he focuses his academic research on the migration of religious and ethnic minorities.

On April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Michael Simonson, from the Leo Baeck Institute, will present a program at the Genealogy Center in conjunction with the institute's exhibition, "1700 Years of Jewish Life in German-Speaking Lands." Mr. Simonson is currently the Director of Public Outreach for the Leo Baeck Institute. In addition to speaking on the topic of the exhibition, he will discuss some of the history of German-speaking Jews in Indiana and nearby. The exhibition will be at the ACPL Genealogy Center for a few weeks in the spring of 2023.

Interested in Prohibition and your criminal ancestors? Ron Arons will speak to that subject on May 7, 2023 at the Genealogy Center. He will begin with "Alcohol, Prohibition and Temperance Societies in Ohio and Indiana," and conclude with "Researching Criminal Ancestors." Ron currently serves on the Board of Directors for the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS). He has authored three books, two of which are related to criminal records.

In addition to these five public programs, NEIJGS members will enjoy two Lunch and Learn programs with ACPL Genealogy Center staff, covering the use of DNA for research and the Periodical Source Index, a tremendous resource originating at the Genealogy Center. Members will also enjoy a fourth program by Dr. Evans, and dinners with those guest speakers visiting in person. On October 3rd, Sara Fiedelholtz presented the Fort Wayne Jewish Federation's history since its formation in 1921, at the prestigious Mather Lecture series at The History Center.

On May 21st, we culminated the Federation's centennial by being recorded in the Minutes of the US Congress and formally receiving a Congressional Letter and a City Proclamation. A 30 minute preview of the 100th documentary in which both Mayor Tom Henry and Governor Eric Holcomb, recognized the contributions of the Jewish Federation to the community during its 100 years. We also enjoyed music, entertainment, delicious food, and of course, Israeli wines - organized with the help of the 100th celebration committee.

After a 2 1/2 year delay, the People of the Book program will return on September 19, with New York Times best selling author, Ron Suskind.

The Federation is pursuing a very special project with the Youth Philharmonic Orchestra, titled "The Mauthausen Cantata" in March.

Dr. David Lindquist will host the Teacher's Holocaust Workshop which prepares teachers in NE Indiana to appropriately conduct Holocaust Education in their classrooms.

The miracle that is the modern State of Israel turns 75 in 2023. Stay tuned...we will be having a very special celebration to commemorate this milestone.

We will continue to reach out and network with local, regional, and national leaders, write letters, speak out against injustices, while always remaining steadfast for Jewish values and principles. The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne will maintain a strong voice and remain vigilant against the perverse and fixated bias directed at Israel, the virulent attacks against Judaism as a religion, and as a people.

May we therefore be the leaders of the change we want to see in the world! Let us all, as a community, stand up for what is right, by speaking out and taking action, when we see injustice. Let us continue to do deeds of kindness or Chesed, as we are commanded to do.

She works for us as a volunteer, on an asneeded basis.
























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PJ Our Way is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored
