We hope that 5783 is off to a great start for you and your loved ones as we continue to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic which has wreaked havoc on so many of our lives. On behalf of the **Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne (JFFW)**, we hope that 5783 will bring happiness, good health and the joy of community to all of us.

During the past 12 months, the world as we know it has once again faced serious challenges that we never could have imagined. Our local Federation, along with **Congregation Achduth Vesholom** came together to raise funds to assist the local Catholic Diocese with the relocation and resettlement of Afghan refugees. In February, when

Russia invaded Ukraine, the Federation raised funds specifically for the **Jewish Agency for Israel (JFFW)** to rescue Ukrainian Jews and others by getting them out of harm's way. The partners of the **Jewish Federations of North America** (**JFNA**) were there to help fleeing refugees as they crossed the border, providing them with food, shelter, medical aid, trauma care, and much more. Federation was there to help refugees take the next steps towards resettlement, whether in Europe, North America or Israel.

Over the last seven months, **JFNA** has also worked to support a new wave of Aliyah from Ethiopia. Currently, over 6,000 Ethiopian olim are being supported in absorption centers as they start new lives in Israel. Each person has an amazing story that instills in us hope and pride.

Locally, the **Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne** steadfastly strives to be a strong presence in Northeast Indiana by offering support, programming and resources when needed. The work of your Federation is as important now as it has ever been.

It remains North American Jewry's sacred commitment during times of need to support Jewish communities and individuals around the world, wherever they may reside. The **JFFW**, along with our network of partners, helps assure that we are not alone. This is at the heart of our collective work and is a shared value we have maintained since the earliest days of Federation.




Your Direct Connection to Israel


DPLE . THE POWER OF COMMUNI

EXPLORING THE CULTURAL JOURNEY OF MAH JONGG

Please join us Sunday, November 6 at 2 p.m. at the Temple when <u>Annelise Heinz</u>, author of *Mahjong! How a Chinese Game Shaped Modern American Culture*, shares with us the American history of the Chinese parlor game mahjong.

She charts a complex cultural journey as the game's history connects American expatriates in Shanghai, Jazz Age white Americans, urban Chinese Americans in the 1930s, Jewish American suburban mothers, and Air Force officers' wives in the postwar era. Her talk follows the history of one game to think about how, in their daily lives, individuals create and experience cultural change.

A historian at the University of Oregon, her work has been featured by National Public Radio, The Wall Street Journal, TIME, Tablet, and Kveller among others. She has lived and played mahjong in the United States and Southwestern China.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF THOUGHTFUL THURSDAYS! Our <u>Thoughtful Thursdays</u>' 12th annual Apple Project was a huge success this year thanks to the Jewish community's continued support. More than 50 people donated at least \$10 each to support our effort.

In October, we were able to provide a bag of delicious Honeycrisp apples for the 51 Brightpoint Head Start children who attend class at the Temple and the Brightpoint staff. One of the teachers told us she only eats apples once a year since tasting the locally grown Honeycrisp apples. She said she can't afford them on her salary so this is a special treat.

This month, our plan is to send home side dishes that go with a Thanksgiving meal, including stuffing, rice, cranberry sauce, green beans, corn muffin mix, chocolate pudding, paper goods, and salt and pepper. Next month, we will be providing rotisserie chickens to the families.

We are also collecting athletic wear (shirts and sweatpants) for the students. All children's sizes 3-8 are needed, with the greatest need in sizes 6-8.

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society (NEIJGS) is excited to welcome historian, Marian Smith, for a free virtual program on Sunday, November 13th, beginning at 2:00 p.m.

More than Manifests: US Immigration and Naturalization Records

Marian Smith will present an overview of major US immigration and naturalization record sets of interest to genealogists researching 19th and 20th century immigrants.

• 2:00 - Information regarding passenger lists, immigration correspondence files, visas, legalizations/ adjustments, 1940 alien registration forms, and alien registration files (A-Files).

• 3:30 - Details regarding court naturalization records, INS naturalization certificate files (C-Files), and naturalization correspondence files.

Some of these records are held by the National Archives, others by the US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), thus request procedures for both will be outlined.

Marian Smith is retired after thirty years as an Historian for the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), later US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS). She now spends some of her time working to create a course on researching US immigration and nationality records, and occasionally speaks to researcher groups on late 19th and 20th century immigration and naturalization record topics.


Following the formal presentations, Marian will honor questions with a special session for NEIJGS members.


WE ARE HERE TO HELP


