#### THE GREATEST GOOD IS WHAT WE DO FOR ONE ANOTHER

Many years ago I had the opportunity to go on a mission to the Former Soviet Union (FSU) and Israel with Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA)... It was a life changing experience for me. I witnessed first hand just a small part of the impact the Federation movement has made on Tikkun Olam, repairing the world.

JFNA plays an ongoing important role to provide an array of life-sustaining services to needy elderly and vulnerable Jews while also supporting the revitalization of Jewish life, especially in communities in Eastern Europe that were decimated by the Holocaust and driven underground by communism (such as the FSU). While in St. Petersburg (Russia), we visited elderly Jews in their 8th floor one-room walk-up apartments. For many of them, the only people they see are the social workers provided by JFNA who check in to see how they are doing, bring them food, cook, pick up their medications and visit with them. We also: Toured clinics, danced the Hora with Seniors; visited an overnight camp for youth who are seeking to reclaim their Jewish roots; participated in a religious service at a reclaimed synagogue; sat down and worked on projects with young adults with mental challenges who are ignored by the Russian government; we attended a very special ORT program with young adults pursuing Aliyah to Israel. These were just a few of the many programs that we attended. Israel is now home to a core Russian Jewish population of over 900,000.

The Federation's portfolio in Israel is widespread and diverse. It is committed to ensuring that every Jew who wants to live in Israel can. The Federation movement funds programs that ensure access to the economic and educational opportunities and support initiatives that encourage religious diversity and social equality. The mission participants visited an Ethiopian Moshav (collective agricultural settlement); attended a special anniversary celebration of Operation Moses (a covert evacuation of Ethiopian Jews). For decades, the Jewish Federations have worked side by side with their partner, the Jewish Agency for Israel, and the Israeli Government to help 100,000 Ethiopian Jews realize their dream of making Aliyah and to support their absorption into Israeli society.

The Jewish Federations of North America, of which you contribute to and are a part of, is the heart and soul of North American Jewry's philanthropic and humanitarian activities. It embodies a 3500 year-old tradition of caring that goes back to the giving of the Torah and sustains us in the bold pursuit of Jewish community, Jewish values and Jewish peoplehood. Federation is made up of people who care enough to want to perfect an imperfect world. Federation is the passion of commitment, where tzedakah and a sense of social justice can make a difference in someone's life. The Jewish Federation is committed to seizing this moment in Jewish history to ensure the continuity of the Jewish people.

# JEWISH CULTURE 16 Jews from Ukraine Who Changed the World

Jews from Ukraine have made essential contributions to Jewish thought and culture, and have also brought world-class talent to science, art, politics and more.

Ukraine has had a significant and vibrant Jewish community going all the way back to the Middle Ages, but the history of Ukrainian Jewry has been difficult, and often marked by periods of intense antisemitism. In addition, it was not always easy to live in a region that was frequently unstable.

Borders shifted following the collapse of the Russian Empire — and later, the Soviet Union — and near-constant persecution and surveillance led many Jews to emigrate elsewhere. But an astonishing number of Ukrainian Jews, whether they spent their entire lives in the country or traveled elsewhere, have made remarkable contributions to the world in art, culture, science, politics, sports and more. Ukraine was also the birthplace of important Jewish developments, most notably <u>Hasidism</u>.

#### **Baal Shem Tov**

The <u>Baal Shem Tov</u> was the founder of Hasidic Judaism, an Orthodox spiritual revivalist movement that has hundreds of thousands of adherents today. Born Israel ben Eliezer in 1698 in Okopy, Ukraine, Baal Shem Tov literally means "Master of the Good Name" and is often abbreviated as Besht.

#### **Golda Meir**

While <u>Golda Meir</u> ascended to international prominence when she was elected prime minister of Israel in 1969, she was born in Kyiv, Ukraine's capital, in 1898. Meir was the fourth woman in the world to serve as a head of state. Other Israeli leaders who were born in Ukraine include Israel's second prime minister **Moshe Sharett**, as well as his successor, **Levi Eshkol**.

#### **Sholem Aleichem**

Born Sholem Rabinovitz in 1859 in Pereyaslav, Ukraine, <u>Sholem Aleichem</u> is considered one of the most beloved Yiddish writers of all time. His short stories about Tevye the Dairyman inspired the hit musical and film *Fiddler on the Boof*.

#### Mila Kunis

Born in Chernivtsi, Ukraine in 1983, Mila Kunis and her family fled the Soviet Union when she was seven years old. Her family was resettled in Los Angeles with the help of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society. Kunis ascended to fame by starring in *That 70's Show* and has had major roles in dozens of shows and films since then.

#### Menachem Mendel Schneerson

Known to many as just "the Rebbe," Menachem Mendel Schneerson was the last rebbe of the <u>Chabad Lubavitch movement</u> and is considered one of the most influential 20th century Jewish leaders. While Schneerson famously led the Chabad movement from its Brooklyn headquarters, he was actually born in Mykolaiv, Ukraine in 1902.

#### **Oksana Baiul**

Figure skater Oskana Baiul made history in 1994 when she became the first athlete representing post-Soviet Ukraine to win a gold medal at the Olympics. While Baiul was raised Orthodox Christian, she discovered and embraced her maternal Jewish ancestry when she was 25 years old. Since retiring from ice skating, she has served as a trustee for the Tikva Children's Home, a Jewish orphanage in Odessa. While swimmer Lenny Krayzelburg represented Team USA at the 2000 and 2004 Summer Olympics, the gold medalist was born and raised in Odessa, until his family fled and resettled in Los Angeles when he was 14. World-renowned tennis player Elina Svitolina won a bronze medal for Ukraine at the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo. Svitolina was also a semifinalist at Wimbledon and the U.S. Open.

#### Selman Waksman

Selman Waksman was born in 1888 in a small village outside of Vinnytsia, Ukraine. As a researcher at Rutgers University in New Jersey, Waksman discovered a number of antibiotics, which led to the first successful treatment of tuberculosis. Waksman was awarded the 1952 Nobel Prize in medicine for his contributions to microbiology. Many other Ukrainian Jewish scientists have made sterling contributions, including Waldemar Haffkine, the microbiologist credited with developing the first vaccines for cholera and bubonic plague, who was born in Odessa in 1860.

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



#### **TUITION REIMBURSEMENT**

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.

A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent



must be earned in the course work in order to qualify for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

# S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

Looking for a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation or special gift for one of our local youth, then please consider making that gift to their **S.K.I.P**. Fund account. An acknowledgment will be sent to you and a card indicating your gift will be sent to the designee.

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#### **Natan Sharansky**

Born in Donetsk, Ukraine in 1948, Natan Sharansky is one of the most famous refuseniks who advocated for <u>Soviet Jewry's</u> right to emigrate during the 1970s and 1980s. Between the years of 1977 and 1986, Sharansky was imprisoned for his activism. After being released, Sharansky immigrated to Israel and entered the world of politics. Sharansky was awarded the Israel Prize in 2018.

#### **Vladimir Horowitz**

Hailed as one of the greatest pianists of all time, Vladimir Horowitz was born in Kyiv in 1903. He left the Soviet Union at 22 years old and went on to reside in Berlin and New York City. After winning dozens of Grammy Awards from the late 1960s to the early 1990s, Horowitz earned the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 1990. There have been many other remarkable Ukrainian Jewish musicians including internationally renowned violinist and six-time Grammy winner Isaac Stern.

#### Jan Koum

Born in Kyiv in 1976, Jan Koum immigrated to California with his mother as a teenager. After working for several years in cybersecurity and programming, Koum invented the messaging application WhatsApp in 2009. WhatsApp has billions of users worldwide and was acquired by Facebook's Meta Platforms for \$19.3 billion in 2014.

#### **Rav Nachman of Breslov**

Rav Nachman, also known as Nachman from Uman or Reb Nachman, was born in Medzhybizh, Ukraine in 1772. A grandson of the Baal Shem Tov, Rav Nachman went on to found the Breslov Hasidic movement, which combined elements of mysticism with Torah writings. He moved to Uman in 1810 and died later that year. Today, Rav Nachman's grave in Uman is a pilgrimage site that receives tens of thousands of visitors each year.

#### **Ilya Kaminsky**

Ilya Kaminsky was born in Odessa in 1977. At age 16, Kaminsky and his family emigrated to the U.S. due to antisemitism in Ukraine. Kaminsky's poetry collections *Dancing in Odessa* and *Deaf Republic* both received international accolades, and Kaminsky was selected as a Guggenheim Fellow in 2018.

#### **Mendel Beilis**

After the body of a missing 13-year-old boy was discovered near the Kyiv factory where he worked,

Mendel Beilis was accused of ritually murdering the child and using his blood to make matzah. Beilis was jailed for more than two years while awaiting trial. While he was eventually acquitted, the month-long trial brought international attention to rampant antisemitism in the Russian Empire. Like the better-known Dreyfus Affair in France several years earlier, the case confirmed for many Ukrainian Jews that the country's leadership was fundamentally antisemitic and drove many to emigrate.

#### Hayim Nahman Biyalik

Born near Volhynia, Ukraine in 1873, Hayim Nahman Bialik is remembered as a pioneer of modern Hebrew poetry. He is just one of many Ukrainian Jews who molded early Israeli literature and Zionist thought. **Ahad Ha'am**, an essayist who was also influential in the revival of Hebrew writing, was born in Skvyra, Ukraine to a Hasidic family in 1856. He is also considered the father of Cultural Zionism; **Ze'ev Jabotinsky**, the founder of Revisionist Zionism, was born in Odessa in 1880. Jabotinsky also established the Beitar youth movement and the Irgun, a paramilitary organization in pre-state Israel.

#### **Shlomo Ganzfried**

A rabbi and expert in <u>Jewish law</u>, Shlomo Ganzfried was born in 1804 in Uzhhorod, Ukraine. Considered a child prodigy in Eastern Europe's yeshiva world, Ganzfried's most notable contribution to Judaism was penning the *Kitzur Shulchan Aruch*, a condensed and easily understood version of the *Shulchan Aruch*, the most widely cited code of Jewish law.

#### Volodymyr Zelensky

Born in the city of Kryvyi Rih in 1978, Volodymyr Zelensky was raised in the area that was once known as the Pale of Settlement, the only region in the Russian Empire where most Jews were permitted to live. While Zelensky gained fame in Ukraine as an actor and comedian, he switched gears in 2019 and successfully ran for Ukraine's presidency where he became a hero to the country in the wake of the Russian invasion in February 2022. # ROASTED CHICKENS PROVIDED TO THOUGHTFUL THURSDAYS

Our Thoughtful Thursdays team is providing a hot, fully-cooked roasted chicken for each of our 51 Brightpoint Head Start families in December. Though we've provided frozen turkeys in the past, we thought the rotisserie chicken was a better choice because of the continued supply chain shortage and rising cost of food.


















<u>PJ Our Way</u> is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored experi-
