NEW FORMS OF AN OLD HATRED

In the past few months, national figures Kanye West, Nick Fuentes and Kyrie Irving, among others, have posted anti-Semitic tropes and ideas on their social media platforms. No longer can the Jewish community brush off these kinds of comments. These public figurers have admirers and followers...

Of the over 18 million Twitter followers that Kanye West (now known as Ye) has, how many are influenced by his comments? As I write this article, Elon Musk just re-instated Nick Fuentes on Twitter. Furthermore, University campuses are sites of sharp controversies over anti-Semitism, as some student organizations have banned pro-Israel speakers and

some Jewish students have been verbally and physically attacked.

In 2021, anti-Semitic events increased by 34% across the United States. The anti-Defamation League (ADL) says that the year 2022 recorded the highest number of anti-Semitic acts since they began tracking in 1979. Anti-Semitic incidents are described as assaults, harassment, intimidation, distribution of hate propaganda, threats, slurs and vandalism.

FBI statistics show that 55% of all religious bias crimes are directed towards Jews, despite making up just 2.5% of the U.S. population. Recently, FBI Director, Christopher Wray warned of the consequences that the sharp rise in anti-Semitic hate crimes pose. Jews were the main victims of these crimes, but not the only ones. Sadly, in October, Thomas Meixner, a Catholic, a University of Arizona professor was murdered on campus by a former student who reportedly insisted that Meixner was the Jewish leader of a Zionist plot against him.

Across Indiana, incidents have included vandalism and anti-Semitic flyers in residential neighborhoods and Houses of Worship. There have been a number of anti-Semitic and bigoted remarks made by politicians and other elected officials.

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and are own Community Relations Council support the work of the Indianapolis Jewish Community Council-JCRC, who along with law enforcement and the ADL, are taking a proactive approach to combating anti-Semitism through partnerships, community building, education and by providing necessary resources.

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne also supports the Jewish Studies program at Indiana University, with more than 40 courses available each year. In 2023, this program will celebrate its 50th anniversary. The department also holds more than 50 webinars featuring some of the most accomplished anti-Semitism scholars in the world, reaching thousands of viewers in over 40 countries.

Unfortunately, local anti-Semitic acts don't always make the news or when they do, they have a very limited shelf life. We want to assure you that our local Federation, along with the Indianapolis JCRC and the Midwest ADL, are aware of these horrific acts and will continue to do our best to take appropriate action when they occur.

Mainly, we want this article to be a warning, not necessarily about your personal safety, but about the dangers of normalization. When we hear about any acts of violence over and over again, we can become desensitized to that issue. This can be true for mass shootings and it is true for anti-Semitic acts. We must always remember that this need not be and should not be normal. It is up to all of us, to call out these horrific events, each and every time. We need to let our community and political leaders know that acts of anti-Semitism are not harmless. We need to make sure that the perpetrators are held accountable to such a degree that these hateful actions are put to an end.

Author of the book, "Anti-Judaism: The Western Tradition, Professor Nirenberg writes, "Historians hope that prejudices will become less compelling if people understand how well-worn they are and how many times they have failed to bring about the better future their adherents promised. History is not a magic amulet that we can rub to protect us from danger as we make our way through a changing world". When it comes to confronting anti-Semitism and other prejudices, we need to remain diligent and pro-active in our quest to combat this evil.








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What are we talking about this month:

A Tu B'Shevat Seder for Kids

Print the Seder



Tu B'Shevat, also known as the birthday of the trees, is an opportunity to strengthen our connection to the environment. In Israel the holiday of <u>Tu B'Shevat</u> arrives along with the first signs of spring, on the fifteenth ("*tu*") day of the month of *Shevat*. This is perfect timing as the trees are beginning to blossom for the coming year.

Fun fact: According to Jewish law, a tree's fruit is ready for picking when it turns three. Tu B'Shevat helped ancient farmers mark where the trees were in the growing process.

Many families have a Tu B'Shevat seder, or ceremonial meal. Just as at a <u>Passover seder</u>, <u>symbolic foods</u> are eaten in a special order in celebration of the important role trees

play in our life. It's traditional to eat Israeli fruits, such as figs, dates, and carobs. It's also customary to eat fruits you haven't tasted before, and to say the <u>Shehecheyanu</u> (a blessing of gratitude when experiencing something new).

On Tu B'Shevat it's tradition to snack on nuts, dried fruit, and other grains.

This version of the Tu B'Shevat seder is perfect to do with younger kids or to try out as your first family <u>Tu B'Shevat</u> celebration. You'll have the opportunity to taste and smell new foods, ask questions, and <u>say blessings together</u>. Use the buttons below to move through the four parts of the seder, each named after a season. If you'd like a slightly more in-depth version that works well with kids ages 8 and up, use <u>this version of the PJ</u> <u>Library Tu B'Shevat seder</u>.

Evans, a Senior Lecturer in diaspora history at the University of Hull, for a series of free virtual programs on Tuesdays in February, beginning at 2:30 p.m. These lectures are in conjunction with the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center's Tuesday afternoon virtual programs.

The Making of a Mosaic: European Migrant Journeys during the Age of Steam

Dr. Evans, a migrant historian, will explore questions such as 'why did so many Europeans leave?' 'What was the journey *really* like?' Why when an ancestor arrived at Ellis Island did they settle in the mid-west?'


- **February 7th**: *Preparing to Leave Europe* This talk will illustrate how one can piece together the gathering of ancestors from their village/town of birth to the moment they commenced their journey west.
- **February 14**th: *The Journey to America* This talk will illustrate the details of both the direct and indirect routes enabling Europeans to reach the American eastern seaboard.
- **February 21**st: Internal Migration within the United States This talk will explore how migrant records enable one to piece together the numerous journeys that complete the migrant's settlement in their new homes.
- **February 28**th: *Resolving Your Genealogical Puzzles* (NEIJGS members only) Pre-assembled questions of NEIJGS members will be addressed, particularly any whose story remains incomplete.

Besides teaching both undergraduate and postgraduate students in the School of Humanities at the University of Hull, Dr. Nicholas Evans uses his research on voluntary and coerced migration around the Atlantic to empower religious and ethnic minority communities. He enjoys helping people unearth the personal stories of their migrant ancestors. Dr. Evans has spent the last 17 years as an academic researcher in the prize-winning Wilberforce Institute for the study of Slavery and Emancipation in his home city of Hull, England.


WE ARE HERE TO HELP
