"IN ORDER TO BE A REALIST, YOU MUST BELIEVE IN MIRACLES." David Ben-Gurion

On March 14th, 1948, late on a Friday afternoon, about 250 invited guests of the World Zionist Organization arrived at the Tel Aviv Museum. As David Ben Gurion reads the Declaration of Independence during the ceremony founding the State of Israel, he adds, "The Land of Israel was the birthplace of the Jewish people. Here, their spiritual, religious, and national identity

was formed. Here, they achieved independence and created a culture of national and universal significance".

On November 29th, 1947, the General Assembly of the United Nations adopted a Resolution for the establishment of an independent Jewish State in Palestine... This recognition by the United Nations of "the right of the Jewish people to establish their independent state may not be revoked. It is, moreover, the self-evident right of the Jewish people to be a nation, like all other nations, in its own sovereign state."

After over 2000 years of wandering and exile, our Jewish homeland was reborn in our beloved Eretz Yisrael. This is truly a modern miracle. The Jewish people are home. The Jewish people have a State of our own. We have a sanctuary, a safe place from the nightmare of antisemitism. We have a modern public square where the best of Jewish values live. We have a modern state where the Hebrew language and Jewish culture thrive.

To quote David Ben Gurion, "Our call goes out to the Jewish people all over the world to rally to our side in the task of immigration and development and to stand by us in the great struggle for the fulfillment of the dream of generations – the redemption of Israel."

It's important to remember and appreciate all that Israel has accomplished in its 75 short years as a State. And it will continue to overcome current obstacles and challenges by continuing to invoke its rich history of values and ideals, as successful nations do. After all, seventy-five is an awkward age at which to judge a nation. Millard Fillmore was president when the United States reached that age.

Although Israel has few natural resources, it is called, "The Start-Up Nation" due to its amazing achievements in desert agriculture, water technology, and hi-tech and its contributions to medicine. Israel is living up to the nation's promise to be a "Midgal Or" – a beacon of light to the world by helping to solve some of humanity's greatest challenges.

On June 11th, 2023, The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne will be the host as we come together to celebrate this important milestone in the history of the Jewish people. Please join us as we say, "Happy Birthday Israel". We are happy that you are here to stay and amazed at all your accomplishments in your first 75 years. Mazel tov to Israel at 75!

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.

A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent



must be earned in the course work in order to qualify for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.


The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

"The Jewish Journey: America"

Narrated by award-winning CBS News journalist Martha Teichner, *The Jewish Journey: America* follows the trajectory of Jewish American life from the earliest arrivals in the mid-17th century through the impact of the Nazi regime in World War II, the creation of Israel, and the new challenges of 21st century assimilation. It also explores the personal stories many faced as they migrated to America, whether for economic opportunity or to escape persecution.

Unlike other immigrant stories, Jewish American history has been rooted in an ever-changing "Old Country" (South America, Europe, Russia, North Africa, and the Middle East to name a few). The film features interviews with top scholars in Jewish history and notable Jewish American writers and immigrants who share stories of those who made a leap of faith to escape persecution or pursue opportunity. It details the varied stories of migration through the last five centuries, with a rarely explored look at the actual journey to get here.

aiwan, Venezuela, and the United Arab Emirates. These are just three of the 36 countries that are part of PJ Library's international program. We have myriad statistics to back up our mission, but as always, it's about stories — not just the ones we share but also the ones created to reflect different cultures. To make the stories even more accessible, many have been translated into English, Hebrew, Spanish, Portuguese, German, Russian, and Ukrainian.

Our hope is that families everywhere see PJ Library books both as mirrors and windows. We want families to see themselves in the stories, so the books feel relatable and relevant. But we also want them to see and learn something new about Jewish customs or traditions that are different than theirs.

PJ Library books are a time-tested way to make that happen. Through stories, children are learning that British Jews created fish and chips, and Moroccan Jews celebrate a separate holiday after Passover called Mimouna. There will always be room to learn something new about the Jewish experience and enhance our own Jewishness.

As Jews, it is a treat when we visit a new synagogue and pick up a *siddur* (prayer book), knowing that even if the songs sound different, we are still among our shared community. PJ Library offers a small taste of that same feeling, knowing that children everywhere are reading some of the same stories, just as Jews have shared the same ancient books for millennia. 
Help is Available






