EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANNUAL MEETING SPEECH - JUNE 11, 2023

Shalom and thank you for attending the 102nd Annual Meeting of



the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

On behalf of the Federation Board of Directors, we extend our sincerest appreciation for your continued support, through your kind words, by your active participation and by your financial support, all of which allows us to reap the harvest for our continued renewal and renaissance.

The members of the Fort Wayne Jewish Federation may be small in number, but to quote Mahatma Gandhi, "In a gentle way, each one of us can shape the world." And we strive to do this by being both a vital presence and a consistent voice for good in our community and in the world in which we live.

Martin Luther King, Jr. challenged an audience in Montgomery, Alabama in 1957, by stressing that "Life's most persistent and urgent quest is, What are you doing for others?"

Our Board, led by Dr. Scott Salon, has worked diligently to ensure our Jewish community has not waivered on our commitment to provide human services to others.

The Jewish value of Tikkun Olam guides us day in and day out as we extend our hands to those in need. Our JFFW pledges to carry out this mandate with both pride and dignity. The sacred virtues of Tikkun Olam are based upon an understanding that each of us has a responsibility to one another and to the world at large, consistent with the moral code of our Torah.

We've had a busy year, as it's become safe to resume our programming following the COVID-19 pandemic. A few of the many programs, sponsorships and support actions the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne has participated in during the past year include:

We were finally able to hold the long-awaited People of the Book event with author Ron Suskind in September. He was well received and we look forward to continuing with this valuable series going forward.

"Confronting the Shoah", the annual six-week class, taught by Dr. David Lindquist, was once again successful and predominantly attended by members of the non-Jewish community including many area teachers.

In response to the devastating earthquake that rocked Turkey and Syria in February of this year, the Jewish Federations of North America launched an earthquake relief fund to provide humanitarian aid and to support recovery efforts. When called upon, our small Federation and members of our community stepped up to send emergency financial assistance.

Camp Joe Levine continues to be a popular outdoor adventure for children in the Fort Wayne Jewish and non-Jewish community.

We owe so much to the Camp Directors, Larisa Drozdova and Sam McGlennon, for their dedication and creativity. We appreciate Rabbi Meir for leading weekly Shabbat, which remains a camp highlight.

Thanks to the Janet Finkel Campership Fund and the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation, the Federation is able to provide financial assistance for Camp Joe and for away camp, such as GUCI in Zionsville. The scholarships that these funds provide help allow children who may not have been able to otherwise attend any camp have an amazing Jewish themed outdoor experience. For many of the children, Camp Joe is the highlight of their summer.

Due in part to the generosity of the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation, area children have been able to participate in the PJ Library book program and events all free of charge.

In an effort to stay connected to our community, Bonnie Pomerantz and I have increased the number of Shabbat and Holiday good will bags we deliver several times per year to members and good friends of the Federation.

We continue to partner with our friends at Public Television PBS39 to air a number of highly regarded documentaries. We began this program during COVID. It has become so well received that we are committed to continuing with it.

We have re-energized the Send A-Kid to Israel Program offered to members of our community. This program is an amazing way to help families afford to send their child on a sponsored trip to Israel after they turn 15. It has very generously been funded through contributions from the Goldenberg and Ruchman families.

Our volunteer social worker, Fran Volante, has stridently reached out to members of our community showing support, kindness and respect. She is a blessing to us all.

Thankfully, we were able to conduct our Yom HaShoah commemoration in person for the first time in four years. The Keynote Speaker, Andrew Lapin, a writer and podcaster, spoke on the effects of the 1930's radio program that was hosted by the rabid anti-Semitic priest Father Charles Coughlin. And Tree of Life survivor, Carol black, who narrowly escaped with her own life, shared her moving story of what it's like to lose her brother to this, the longest hatred. There are no words to express how deeply her story moved everyone at this service.

The JFFW continues to speak out on the malignant growth of anti-Semitism whether it is from the right or from the left. And we solemnly vow, along with our partners at the Indiana Jewish Community Relations Council, to remain vigilant, pro-active and continue to bring a strong voice against the perverse and fixated bias directed at the State of Israel and the virulent attacks against Judaism as a religion and as a people.

With the rise of antisemitism on college campuses, we support agencies that help counter the anti-Israel activists who hound and exclude Jewish students while university Presidents remain silent.

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANNUAL MEETING SPEECH - JUNE 11, 2023

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Part of combating evil of all kinds includes educating and calling out hate speech and anti-Semitic rhetoric whenever it occurs. The anti-Semitism of 2023 has nothing to do with any Jew's faith, spirituality or level of observance, but everything to do with the mindset of the perpetrators...rooted in fear, a desire for power, ignorance, fake news, just to name a few reasons.

As your Executive director, the JFFW will continue to work relentlessly to build positive dialogue and support for both Israel and our Jewish community with local, state and national political and religious leaders.

These are just a few of the things that fill our days.

Going forward we have many things in the works.

If you recall, we underwrote the development and produced a documentary film which chronicled the important and vital history the citizens of Fort Wayne's Jewish community have played during the past 100 years, including highlighting many of Fort Wayne's Jewish families that have deep long-standing roots. This documentary also made of note that Achduth Vesholom is the home to the oldest Jewish Congregation in the state of Indiana and it explored the important role Fort Wayne has played in the establishment of both the Reform Jewish movement and the Hebrew Union College.

The Film further highlighted the significant role that Fort Wayne's Jewish community and its citizens have had over the past century and continue to have in Fort Wayne's arts, culture, social services and other major organizations.

It explores the Federation's vital role in our area and how it continues to evolve and remain relevant not only to the Jewish community, but also to the community at large. Through the collection of archival photos, materials and first-person interviews, this documentary will stand the test of time and serves as a collective memory of Fort Wayne's Jewish community.

Due to the vast number of contributions including countless hours of interviews made by the Jewish community, this documentary has taken longer than originally expected to edit. Our hope is by later this summer to have a date set for a viewing.

This fall, on October 27th, through the generosity of the Martha Replane Arts and Cultural Fund, the Jewish Federation is partnering on a very special project with the Fort Wayne Youth Orchestra, led by Youth Orchestra Conductor, Troy Webdell. It is titled "Mauthausen Cantata." We will keep you posted as more promotional materials become available.

The Jewish Federation, Congregation Achduth Vesholom and the Purdue Fort Wayne Institute of Holocaust and Genocide Studies have joined together to plan all Holocaust Education programming going forward.

The name of this committee is "Zachor". The Jewish Federation

will chair with co-chairs coming from both the congregation and the institute. By coming together in one committee, we will be able to strengthen and widen the range of Holocaust Education opportunities in Northeast Indiana. To quote J. C. Penney: "Growth is never by mere chance; it is the result of forces working together."

As always, our gratitude and heartfelt appreciation goes out to our Federation's small staff, Office Manager Bonnie Pomerantz, Accountant Jeff Griggs and Volunteer Social Worker, Fran Volante. They are simply the BEST!

I thank Scott Salon and Bonnie Pomerantz for keeping the Federation moving forward when I had to take medical time off last year.

The Jewish Federation continues to thrive due to our outstanding leadership: President Dr. Scott Salon, the supportive Board of Directors, the committee members and our volunteers. We appreciate each and every one of you who has shown support with your attendance and with your generous contributions.

We thank the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation and the Dr. Louis and Anne B. Schneider Foundation, our extraordinary spiritual leader Rabbi Meir Bargeron and the Temple Staff. There are truly no words to express how thankful we are for all their support.

On a personal note, I want to thank this entire community for the incredible kindness shown to me during the unexpected major illness I experienced this past year. Thank you for the meals, flowers, cards, calls, and emails letting me and my family know that your thoughts and prayers were with us during that challenging time. It meant everything! Never underestimate what these thoughtful gestures mean to someone!

As President Lyndon B. Johnson said, "There are no problems we cannot solve together and very few we can solve by ourselves."

In conclusion:

Because of our traditions and code of ethics, we are a people who have not only survived, but will continue to make significant contributions to each and every community we have inhabited, as we have done for the past 3,000 years. PRESIDENT ANNUAL MEETING SPEECH - JUNE 11, 2023

To begin, I want to acknowledge what a privilege it is to be part of the leadership of this organization which has and continues to do so much to support the continuation and wellbeing of the Jewish community of Fort Wayne and the surrounding area; and through affiliation with the Jewish Federations of North America, to the Jewish people throughout the world. Its impact, however, transcends the Jewish community: its social, educational and cultural offerings benefit the entire community. The relationships which the Federation has cultivated with other faith based organizations enrich the entire community: promoting goodwill, fellowship, and enhancing the quality of life for all.

From its limited beginning as a burial society, its scope and reach has evolved into its current iteration which provides a broad range of service to the community. Our "minority status" in numerical terms belies the impact that the organization, both past and present, has had in and on Fort Wayne. Being a founding partner organization of the Community Chest, now the United Way, demonstrates the Federation's commitment to improving the fabric of community life. The largess and civic engagement of past Federation leaders and its members is something of which we can all be proud, as it reflects the deep and enduring commitment to its foundational principles.

I believe it is important to acknowledge that the majority of our continued relevance and success can be attributed to the commitment and performance of our Executive Director and Office manager whose dedication and efforts far exceed expected roles. It isn't possible to adequately describe the respective contributions of Jaki and Bonnie. That being said, we are truly blessed to have them running the show, and we are also indebted to the efforts of the Board in maintaining our focus and operations.

I can, therefore, confidently report, that our organization is sound, as well as committed to addressing the current needs and growing challenges facing the Jewish community here and worldwide.

Unfortunately, recently, the virulence of the world's oldest hatred, and the violence associated with it, has risen year over year in the US. This is something that I would never have considered realistic in the post World War II era in which I grew up. I would have thought it "not only unlikely but rather preposterous" that Jewish communal events, whether religious or cultural, would necessitate the presence of security. However, that's today's reality. And given that reality, this Federation and the National organization, is monitoring, preparing, and where and when appropriate, responding.

Our current Zeitgeist, has caused me to reflect on the challenges that the Jewish community faced nearly a hundred years ago with the ascent of Fascism in Germany and its open support in the US. My parents and grandparents didn't talk to me about their experiences in regard to the political climate prior to the Second World War. I know, however, that they, like many others in the Jewish community of that era, set an example for those of us coming after. They ensured there would be an organized voice to stand up for the community, ensure its safety, and promote Jewish social and cultural activities by endowing the Federation. Their foresight and largess allows us to do as much as we are able to do to-day with a diminished Jewish presence in our community.

I'm hoping with the apparent economic Renaissance we are seeing in Fort Wayne that we will also see an increasing Jewish presence here. I hope further that we will follow the example of those who proceeded us by ensuring that those who come after will have the strong voice, as well as the social, cultural, and community resources that the Federation provides.

How a book becomes a book

HOW A BOOK BECOMES A BOOK

PJ LIBRARY AUTHOR

When those blue-and-white envelopes arrive in mailboxes around the globe, kids everywhere rejoice. But have you ever stopped to think about the journey those books take to get there? It's more than the mail trucks and cargo ships that transport the books. We're talking about the long and twisting path from manuscript to bound book!

I have been on the editorial end of this process for years, but recently I got to experience it from the author's vantage point when my picture book Yitzi the *Trusty Tractor* was published by PJ Publishing. I asked Samara Klein, publisher of PJ Publishing, to help me identify the landmarks a PJ Publishing book has to hit as it wends its way to your doorstep.



The Muse

Who can say how it happens? An idea strikes, and the author (or author-illustrator!) puts the proverbial pen to paper. In my case, I had read a famous old midrash about Rabbi Yochanan ben Torta and the cow and thought it would be fun to reimagine the story in a contemporary setting.



The Submission

Along with hundreds of authors each year, I submitted my manuscript (anonymously) to the PJ Library Book Selection Committee and happily, they accepted it. When the book selection committee accepts submissions directly from an author rather than an independent publisher, then PJ Publishing takes a look. And if PJ Publishing likes it ...





... then the author and publisher execute an agreement, and the fun really begins!



The Plot

Samara works directly with authors to edit and plot out the books. We're not talking about a story plot; in this case, plotting refers to figuring out what words and art will appear on each page. "Picture books have to be in increments of eight," Samara explains, which is because of how the pages of books are printed, folded, and bound. "Ours tend to be 24 or 32 pages. We need to reserve some pages for the title page, copyright information, and perhaps some back matter, but the remaining pages are ours to play with. We want the text to be visually represented, and we want it to move very nicely from page to page, to have a nice flow to it. It's like a puzzle." She's right about that - it's harder than I realized, and she's a whiz at it.



The Red Pen

Once the pages have been plotted out, it's time to focus on the details and revise, revise, revise. This part can feel tedious at times, but it's all to make the book the best it can be. We all need editors, even the most brilliant writers and of course, PJ Library authors are among the most brilliant writers (ahem). In all seriousness, I could not be more grateful for good editing!

Printing, Packing, and Mailing

Once the proofs are approved and everything looks good, the books are printed, bound, and put into envelopes for shipping. And then ...



Proofs

The name of this magazine hints at this step – proofs! While proofreaders are involved at several stages along the way, the printer proofs are the last chance to make sure every i is dotted and every t is crossed and that the art looks just like it's supposed to.



You've Got Mail

... they arrive in mailboxes and on doorsteps around the world, brand-spanking-new. It's our hope that one day your children will read PJ Library books to their children and maybe even their children's children. What could be a greater marker of a book's success?



Design

... and then the art and text were handed off to a designer, who meshed it all together. This is the stage when branding elements are added, along with backcover and flap copy. But occasionally there are some other fun ingredients added to the mix. "Sometimes we have a book with special stuff," Samara adds. Some books have pull tabs and lift-the-flap elements that allow readers to interact with books, so this requires a unique process. "We receive a prototype where the printer puts together by hand a blank dummy of what the book will feel like."



The Canvas

One thing I had never thought about was how the book would be shaped: Should it be tall (portrait) or wide (landscape)? Would it have large sweeping pages or be a tiny jewel box of a book? "The physicality of a book has a lot of bearing on the illustrations," Samara explained to me. Before illustrators begin their work, they need to know what they're working with.

The Art

Some PJ Publishing submissions come from author-illustrators, which means the art is already part of the deal, but my submission didn't, which is often the case. To help us pick the perfect artist for the book, Samara began pulling illustrator samples to share with me. "Sometimes we'll have an illustrator in mind from the get-go," Samara says. "Other times, we'll look through dozens and dozens of portfolios and illustrator agencies to find the right match." It didn't take long for both of us to agree that Shelley Couvillion's wonderful rustic style was a perfect fit for *Yitzi*.














<u>PJ Our Way</u> is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored experi-
