EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR - JAKI SCHREIER



One of the responsibilities of the Jewish Federation, along with Congregation Achduth Vesholom and the Purdue Fort Wayne Institute of Holocaust and Genocide Studies (Zachor Committee) is to pay tribute to the memory of the victims of the Holocaust and affirm our commitment to counter antisemitism, racism, and other forms of intolerance by providing a variety of Holocaust Education to members of our community. As the number of survivors who lived through and bore witness to the atrocities of the Shoah diminishes, it is increasingly important for the world to safeguard the memory of the Shoah. Therefore, advocating on behalf of Holocaust survivors, by promoting Holocaust awareness and education and by fighting against not only Holocaust denial, but also against any distortion, trivialization or any falsification of that history, has long been one of our priorities. Unfortunately, given the continual rise of antisemitism, it is arguably more important than

Holocaust Education is primarily the historical study of the systematic, bureaucratic, state-sponsored persecution and murder of six million Jews by Nazi Germany and its collaborators. It gives us a starting point to examine warning signs that can indicate the potential for mass atrocity. It raises questions about human behavior and our capacity to succumb to scapegoating or giving simple answers to complex problems in the face of societal challenges.

As my husband, Eric, and I were planning a trip to Europe, it was important to us that we go to sites where Jewish life was once strong in the countries we visited, Poland, Czech Republic, and Germany.

In Warsaw, Poland, we toured the remains of the Warsaw Ghetto. The Warsaw Jewish community had once been the largest in Europe. At one point, over 400,000 Jews lived in the ghetto, most of them killed by the Nazis. We learned that the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising was the largest single revolt by Jews during World War II. On April 19, 1943, after German troops surrounded the ghetto, over 700 members of the Jewish underground staged an uprising that lasted almost one month. At least 7,000 Jews died as a result. When the inmates of the Warsaw Ghetto took up arms, they did not do so in the hope of achieving a decisive victory. Nor did they do it to ensure their own survival. Their resistance was meant to demonstrate that Jews could fight, that they would not go without a fight.

We toured the Jewish Quarter in Krakow, once home to over 68,000 Jews, most of whom were sent to their deaths at Auschwitz. We visited the Jewish Quarter in Prague, Czech Republic, once home to a vibrant Jewish community. We toured Jewish communities and memorials in Wittenberg and Berlin, Germany. It was imperative to us that we take a trip to Auschwitz while in Poland as over 1.3 million people, most of them Jews, were deported to the Auschwitz camp complex, of whom 1.1 million were murdered. There are simply no words that can describe what one feels when seeing this camp first hand.

Due to the remaining witnesses of the Shoah and the Second World War becoming fewer in number, it is up to the post-Holocaust generations to transmit the memories of the survivors, together with their moral legacies, into the future.

The Zachor Committee is committed to fight all forms of antisemitism, racism, bigotry and xenophobia directed against other national, religious, ethnic, or racial groups. We thank you for your continual support and commitment as we continue on with this important task.

"Faces of the Fort," launched in 2021, was designed to share stories and faces of the community through large-scale murals that have been strategically placed throughout Fort Wayne. The five existing "Faces of the Fort" murals celebrate the social rights, social justice stories, and immigration of current and past Fort Wayne residents. Artist Lyndy Bazile did an amazing job capturing Harriet and Monica by sharing their decades-long efforts towards civil rights for all.





Temple Beth El, in Muncie IN, founded in 1885, is investing in the future of midwestern Jewish life by hiring Rabbi Edie Yakutis. Prior to selecting her, the congregation had been served by HUC-JIR students from the Cincinnati campus since at least 1909. Rabbi Yakutis was ordained in Cincinnati earlier this year. She is a second-career rabbi, with a

focus on chaplaincy in addition to working in congregational life.

Rabbi Yakutis became a student at HUC-JIR after a number of years with the Microsoft Corporation. Her corporate experience honed her leadership skills through a variety of team and managerial positions. During her tenure, she specialized in creating multi-disciplinary teams, working on solutions to corporate problems and mission situations.

She and her husband, Leo, were one of the 11 founding families of Temple Solel, in Fort Mill, SC, a small and energetic congregation outside of Charlotte, NC. She served there as a lay leader, which sparked her dream of becoming a rabbi. In addition to her husband, Rabbi Yakutis has a son and daughter-in-law and a nephew all living nearby






How to Braid a Round Challah for Rosh Hashanah

Challah is usually shaped in a simple long braid, but you can turn any challah into a special Rosh Hashanah bread by braiding it in the round. Worried that round challah may be too complicated for you? Prepare your favorite challah dough and then follow along with the steps below. If you can braid a standard challah, you can definitely make a round challah.


This Activity Works With These Books:







DIRECTIONS



- 1. Shape the dough into six strands of equal length.
- 2. Lay three strands horizontally on a floured surface, then weave the other three strands into them vertically. Lift the bottom strands as needed to weave the top strands in. The ends of the strands will stick out.
- 3. Now braid the ends together on all four sides.
- 4. Gently tuck the braided edges underneath the middle section. *Voila!* A round challah!

GREG SHOUP TO HIGHLIGHT "MEET YOUR MISHPOCHA"

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is thrilled to welcome local meteorologist, Greg Shoup, as the featured speaker for "Meet Your Mishpocha," the society's annual open house on Sunday, September 10th from 10:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

In his presentation, "Surprise! I'm Jewish!," Greg will share the story of his newfound Jewish roots - how he learned of his roots through DNA

testing, and worked with genealogist, Marlise Gross, to trace his connection to the Kisselhoff family and their heritage in Russia, the United Kingdom, and America. His presentation will begin at 11:00 a.m. For those unable to attend in-person, the registration link can be found on the NEIJGS website at http://neindianajgs.org/upcoming-events/.

Before and after Mr. Shoup's presentation, guests can take advantage of a wide variety of family history resources. Bring your old photos and documents to get digitized and take the scans home on a free thumb drive! Check out the Fort Wayne Jewish Families Database, with information about more than 7,000 people with Jewish roots in Northeast Indiana. NEIJGS members will be on-hand to answer questions about beginning genealogical research, including using DNA and conquering adoption challenges. Steve Carr will be there from Purdue Fort Wayne's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies to introduce new Holocaust resources available through the Shoah Foundation and the Yale Fortunoff Video Archive. And representatives from the Indiana Jewish Historical Society and the Oral History Video Project will answer questions about their programs. Irv Adler will provide the latest

details about the International Conference on Jewish Genealogy taking place in Fort Wayne in August of 2025. The NEIJGS will offer a free DNA kit as a door prize to one lucky attendee at the conclusion of the event.


Help is Available




