While perusing the internet a few days ago (something I'm way too guilty of doing now), I came upon a lovely poem written by Nikki Banas. I liked it so much I wrote it out in the Gratitude Journal that I keep. It's about the importance of Kindness.

"You never really know the true impact you have on those around you. You never know how much someone needed that smile you gave them. You never know how much your kindness turned someone's entire life around. You never know how much someone needed that long hug or deep talk.

## Amalia Ran, Regional Director to the Midwest The Jewish Agency for Israel

Simchat Torah, Shabbat morning, 6:30 am (Israel time), October 7, 2023. The day our world shuttered. While Israelis in the kibbutzim and towns near the Gaza border were slowly rising, terror organizations, lead by Hamas in Gaza, launched a brutal attack on Israel on multiple fronts. Thousands of rockets were fired into cities all over the country, while hundreds of terrorists from Gaza infiltrated towns in the south of Israel and massacred indiscriminately innocent civilians. More than three weeks after this horrific day, the magnitude of the atrocities committed is still unimaginable and unprecedented - 1,400 Israelis are confirmed dead, more than 5,400 have been injured, and 240 are held as hostages in Gaza, among them 30 children, the youngest only 9-months old, elderly and Holocaust survivors, injured and disabled civilians. A special state of emergency was declared and an extensive mobilization of IDF reserves was called up, officially launching "Iron Swords."

The horrific news from the Gaza border and the images of barbaric terror attacks in the Kibbutzim and towns revealed a sight which we never imagined we would witness in Israel. Among the first responders on the ground during that Black Saturday was The Jewish Agency for Israel. We established a dedicated control center and mobilized our Fund for Victims of Terror to provide a first and immediate response. The Fund provided immediate grants for families and individuals who have been injured or hospitalized, and to bereaved families. On that Shabbat, the Fund's team reached out to families who were directly impacted, identifying them through local authorities based on our organized, coordinated efforts, alongside inquiries that came to us directly from the field. A call center for the public to handle inquiries was opened as well. One of our main challenges was to reach families outside of the southern authorities, especially those who lost loved ones at the Re'im party.

The reaching out to bereaved families is complex and extensive, and it is taking place on a scale that we have never experienced before, and our FVOT team is there to listen, embrace, and support alongside providing financial assistance. So far, 3,573 families have received assistance from the FOVT. In total, we have been in touch with around 4,700 families, whom we are assisting with getting the immediate support of the fund. Additionally, a new fund for emergency aid for small business in the south, Support Business IL, provides emergency grants for business affected by the war in southern Israel.

At the same time, we are also committed to the safety and resilience of those under our care: Olim (new immigrants) and lone soldiers, Amigour residents, Maza participants, pre-army academies, Youth Futures families, Youth villages and partnerships. Amigour is a subsidiary company of The Jewish Agency for Israel that provides subsidized housing for 7,000 Holocaust survivors, new immigrants, and low-income seniors in 56 homes throughout Israel. There, they receive a wide range of social services and community activities. Of all our residents across Israel, some 5,000 live in southern and central Israel, the regions hardest-hit right now by Hamas' rockets. Residents of Amigour are lucky enough to live in sheltered housing units which makes it possible for them to remain in their homes during rocket attacks from Gaza. However, many of them are elderly and would not be able to safely run for shelter in the event that there is a siren. Our Amigour staff provides all of the basic necessities directly to its residents such as food packages and other social services to make sure that they are attended during these difficult times.

With the aftermaths of October 7, we also had to evacuate new Olim from our absorption centers in the southern and northern regions to safer locations in the country. These immigrants, predominantly from Ethiopia, Russia, and Ukraine, have all escaped hardships in hopes for a better life in Israel. As The Jewish Agency absorption centers offer a supportive environment to assist immigrants in their integration process into Israeli society, this vulnerable population relies on the safety of their new home. However, the current war in Israel has intensified their challenges, with security threats constantly looming overhead. The distress and fear experienced by these olim, as they rush to seek shelter from incoming rockets, have taken a toll on their mental well-being. Our teams are working to provide the Olim with emotional, educational and psychological support, as well as to quarantee their personal safety.

While all eyes focus on Israel and our emergency campaign, our delegation in North America also suffers from the aftermaths of the atrocities. Many of our shlichim were affected by the events of October 7, some suffered personal losses in their immediate families and circle of friends, and some recruited for reserve duty. While we emphasize the importance of their work and service particularly during dire times, we are also responsible for their emotional, mental and psychological health. The dramatic increase in reported antisemitic attacks across the world, including unprecedented anti-Israel rallies with pro-terror rhetoric on campuses, require a daily contact with shlichim and partners to provide emotional, physical, and educational support.

We could not accomplish all of this without the massive support and ongoing solidarity from federations, communities and partners all over the world. In my closing remarks for my original article intended to be published on Sukkot, I wrote: "It is no secret that Israel is experiencing a contentious moment while social unrest and political debate loom over our wish to keep the notion of peoplehood, connectiveness and unity." Little did we know what the morning of October 7 would bring to our thresholds. Now more than ever, I pray to remind us to keep our ears and hearts open, to stay connected, to share our unity as one people, to show our love and support for Israel. I hope for the strength to overcome this tragedy and the knowledge to do so as we always did throughout generations. *Am Israel Chai*.







## What are we talking about this month:

### A LITTLE BIT OF LIGHT...

## My son is afraid of the dark.

I don't blame him.

Darkness, in addition to making us vulnerable and confused, is paralyzing.

We have no shortage of darkness in our world today. Suffering. Conflict. Injustice. The headlines, images, and videos flood our consciousnesses. Though statistics show that globally, these forms of suffering are less prevalent than they have ever been, in our interconnected world we see, hear, and feel them more than ever. Events halfway across the world unfold in our living rooms and on our cell phones.

Yet as close as they feel, they are also so distant. The problems feel so big and complex. Solutions, and our role in them, can often feel so far away. This reality, of both closeness and distance to very real pain and trauma in the world, can leave even the most well intentioned person feeling overwhelmed and afraid. Worse, it can leave us feeling disempowered—like there is nothing we can do to improve our world. Paralyzed.

Not so, says the Jewish tradition.

In the winter time, the darkest time of the year, we light lights, growing in number until we reach eight, the number of possibility, of breaking out of what seems possible, breaking out of what is "natural" and what should be, into the realm where the weak overcome the mighty, where the unimaginable happens, where good triumphs over evil. The realm of the good that no one thought could happen, the realm of miracles.

#### All it takes is a little light.

Darkness can feel all consuming, infinite. Yet the littlest light can chase so much darkness away.

Each of us has light inside of us that can chase away some darkness. Each of us can change the world.

The great sage Maimonides in the Mishne Torah teaches us to picture the world as a balance, teetering on the edge between good and evil. Through each deed we do, we tilt it towards either direction. Sometimes we do this in ways that we can know-feeding the hungry or visiting a sick person. Sometimes it happens in ways we will never know-educating a grandchild who will change her world or planting a tree that won't yield fruits for 70 years.

Darkness and light fill the world. Each of us can add or subtract to the light every day, through every interaction with another person, with the environment around us, with our selves. The question is not whether or not we can change the world-we are whether we like it or not. The question is not if, but how. How will we change the world?

What seeds will we plant? What lights will we light?

RABBIARI HART is the Associate Rabbi of the Hebrew Institute of Riverdale. He studied at Yeshivat Hakotel, the Pardes Kollel, and is a graduate of Yeshivat Chovevei Torah. Rav Ari is also a founder of Uri L'Tzedek, an inaugural member of the Schusterman Fellowship, and was named by the Jewish Week as one of the "36 under 36 young Jewish changing the face of the Jewish community."



#### **TUITION REIMBURSEMENT**

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent



must be earned in the course work in order to qualify for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

## S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

#### **CRYPTO-JEWS AND CONVERSOS**

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is excited to welcome Schelly Talalay Dardashti and Maria Apodaca both representing the Society for Crypto-Judaic Studies. This free virtual program will take place on Sunday, February 18, 2024, beginning at 2:00pm.

- 2:00 pm: "The New World: Migration, DNA, and Genetics," Schelly looks at events in Spain and Portugal which contributed to the New World migration of conversos/ bnai anusim, supported by DNA and genetic evidence.
- 3:30 pm: "And it Only Took 500 Years" Maria will share her family's story whose beginning stems from 1598 in New Mexico when Captain Juan de Onate brought the first colonists to what was then New Spain. Her family had previously been forced to convert to Catholicism and, as her family's historian, Maria became interested in DNA.

Schelly Talalay Dardashti, a journalist and a genealogist, who has lived in Teheran, Tel Aviv, Miami, Los Angeles, and Las Vegas, is a New Mexican by choice. She is the US Genealogy Advisor for MyHeritage, and has traced her Ashkenazi, Sephardi and Mizrahi families across Iran, Spain, Belarus, Russia, and Ukraine for decades. An early proponent of DNA for genealogy, she co-admins several DNA projects at FamilyTreeDNA. The former Jerusalem Post genealogy columnist ("It's All Relative," 1999-2005), she created the award-winning "Tracing the Tribe - The Jewish Genealogy Blog," and "Tracing the Tribe - Jewish Genealogy on Facebook."

Maria Apodaca presents her family's history and traditions along with her own personal journey. Her paternal Y-DNA is J2-M172 with the Cohen Modal Signature, and her research goes back to Diego Blandin Gonzales (b.1558 Coimbra, Portugal; d.1598 Nueva Espana). As the first returnee in her family, she is active in Jewish community life. She is a founding member, Centro Sefarad New Mexico; board member, Society for Crypto-Judaic Studies; steering committee member, JGS of New Mexico; speaker, Road Scholar speaker on New Mexico's conversos and crypto-Jews; and has presented at numerous conferences.


## Help is Available

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


### Which books did you receive this month?










