"On the morning of October 7, 2023, which was both Shabbat and Simchat Torah, the world awakened to the Hamas attacks on Israel - the wanton murder of Israelis and the taking of hostages. In terms of the sheer loss of life and the ensuing trauma, it was the worst day in Jewish History since the end of the Shoah. This tragedy has come to be known as 'black Sabbath." On that tragic October day, Hamas violated a long-standing ceasefire agreement with Israel. Three thousand Hamas terrorists infiltrated Israel and murdered over 1200 innocent Israelis, along with 31 Americans. Two hundred and forty human beings were taken hostage, from infants to seniors, several who were Holocaust survivors. Hamas still holds over 100 hostages. This heinous attack is illegal under every international law of war. Hamas has clearly stated that their intent is to destroy Israel by the elimination of the Jews.

We mourn all who have lost their lives in both Israel and Gaza and hold Hamas responsible for each of these deaths. Hamas could end the war by giving up the remaining hostages and their commitment to the annihilation of the State of Israel and the Jewish people.

Hamas rules Gaza and is ultimately responsible for the Palestinainas who live there. Hamas uses their own citizens as human shields while the terrorists hide in over 300 miles of tunnels they built underneath the cities of Gaza using funds intended to benefit the people of Gaza.

The Jewish Federations of North America has collectively raised over \$800 million dollars to assist with the many humanitarian needs of the Israeli people. (Please subscribe to the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne updates). The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and Congregation Achduth Vesholom hosted a Swords of Iron rally on December 16, 2023. Collectively, our community has raised almost \$300,000 of which 100% is directed to aid those in need.

Let us stand up for Israel, with all her imperfections, as this may be the only way to change the terrorist trajectory towards the State and people we care about

International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) Working Definition of Antisemitism

Antisemitism is a certain perception of Jews, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jews. Rhetorical and physical manifestations of antisemitism are directed toward Jewish or non-Jewish individuals and/or their property, toward Jewish community institutions and religious facilities.

The Indianapolis Jewish Community Relations Council and the Indiana Jewish community came together to pass the House Bill 1002 (International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance - Working Definition of antisemitism) by making phone calls and submitting letters to Indiana Legislators and State Senators. We believe that defining what antisemitism is, is critical to fighting antisemitism. In 2016, a consortium of 31 countries, including the United States, developed and formally adopted the Working Definition of Antisemitism. At present, 34 states, the U.S. Department of State, 45 countries, over 1200 institutions around the world, and nearly 50 Jewish organizations and institutions in Indiana have endorsed the definition. Thus, adopting the IHRA will allow Indiana to be aligned with the standard across the country.

This bill was necessary for many reasons, including the nearly 400% increase in antisemitism encounters in the months following the October 7th attack on Israel, according to the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). These increases include students on college campuses and K-12 classrooms that are being targeted with a shocking frequency. Sadly, many administrators and professors are turning a blind eye to antisemitism.

We do believe that fighting antisemitism, like fighting all forms of hate, should not and is not a political or partisan issue. This definition is an educational tool to assist authorities, educators, and administrators who are responsible for identifying and combating antisemitism, including monitors and data collectors of antisemitic crimes and rhetoric. This working definition will also be helpful to understand the differences between antisemitic speech and criticism of Israel. This definition does not preclude criticism of Israel similar to that of any other country. HB 1002 adds the definition to the education code, not the criminal code.

We applaud those who put forth the effort to get HB 1002 passed.

When You Support Hamas, You're Not Supporting Palestinians



Since Hamas began the war in Gaza on October 7, there's been a tremendous outpouring of support in the US for the Palestinian cause and for Hamas specifically. On its face, the Gaza war has all the elements of a good-versus-evil movie: big superpowers with big weapons and far, far too much civilian death.

It's easy to side with the little guy. It feels righteous. The question is, what exactly are you siding with? And does what you

support actually help the Palestinian cause?

I've lived in the Middle East for over three decades. For the future of my children, I truly think that Israel needs to allow our Palestinian neighbors to live as they choose — as long as they don't threaten us. I've seen the Occupation up close and personal, and I despise it. I sincerely want the people of Gaza and the West Bank to become self-reliant and productive members of the international community. And I've done my small part through work with various organizations to help make this happen. To many Israelis, that makes me pro-Palestinian. So be it.

The question is: are YOU pro-Palestinian? When you like posts on social media that accuse Israel of being a Nazi state, when you demonstrate dressed as Hamas terrorists, when you send money to Hamas, when you block traffic chanting "From the river to the sea, Palestine will be free" - does that make you a supporter of a brighter future for Palestinians? What exactly are you supporting?

The fact is that the war in Gaza is against Hamas – a brutal Islamic terror organization just like ISIS, which your tax dollars helped stamp out across Syria and Iraq - not against the Palestinian people. And the Hamas, sadly, does not serve Palestinian interests.

Over the course of almost two decades from the time it seized power in Gaza, Hamas did not serve Palestinian interests because it created no new industries. It built little critical infrastructure. It did not measurably further public health or encourage higher education so as to offer the people of Gaza a better future. What it did do is

divert hundreds of millions of international aid dollars into terror infrastructure – massive, reinforced tunnels to protect its terrorists (but not civilians) and thousands of rockets to fire indiscriminately into crowded Israeli cities.

How does this help Palestinians?

Today, Hamas does not serve Palestinian interests because it takes no steps to alleviate the suffering of the population in Gaza during the fighting. Quite the opposite. The United States has documented many instances of Hamas fighters literally hiding behind civilians or preventing them from fleeing areas where there is active fighting. The UN has documented armed Hamas terrorists stealing international aid trucks – literally shooting people trying to get food, hoarding it for military use rather than distributing it to the populace.

How does this help Palestinians?

But mostly, Hamas does not serve Palestinian interests because it brutalized, raped, murdered and obscenely defiled the bodies of some 1200 children, women, senior citizens and men (many not even Israeli Jews) in the unprovoked attacks of October 7 – the largest terror attack since 9/11.

How does this help Palestinians? Is this what you support?

I don't expect every American to be a flag-waving Zionist. But if you want to support the Palestinian cause, demonstrate for and donate to organizations that build for the future of Palestinians. Support groups that encourage coexistence, that facilitate cooperation, that call for moderation and that educate for peace, not hatred. Watch out for faux pro-Palestinian causes like the recently-launched Tech for Palestine. Behind their rhetoric, these initiatives offer anti-Israel gimmicks at best, and conduits to fund terror at worst.

Supporting the elimination of Hamas-ISIS in Gaza is supporting the elimination of evil. Eliminating evil can carry a terrible price – but so can supporting it. Where do you stand?

What is a mensch? The word means "person" in Yiddish, the language once dominant among Jews in central and Eastern Europe. Yiddish words such as *schlep* (to drag or carry), *chutzpah* (audacity), and *kvell* (to burst with pride)

have entered English dictionaries. So has mensch, which has come to mean a "good person"someone honest and upstanding.

What does it take to be a mensch? Being a good listener, a kind friend, and someone who loves to fulfill a mitzvah or two, all make someone a mensch. To learn more, and to encourage all of the members of your family to be a bit more "menschy," check out the following activities, discussion questions, and story books.

Talk it over

When have you been kind to others? When have others been kind to you? What does it mean to be a good friend?

Sometimes children (and, okay, grown-ups too) need a little reminding, but every day is a new day to be menschen (plural of mensch) — in other words, our best selves. One easy way to do this? Have good manners!

shows her grandmother and Estie herself what a mensch the girl can really be.



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TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent



must be earned in the course work in order to qualify for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE TO EXPLORE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM IN AMERICA AND THE MEANING OF OUR 175th ANNIVERSARY

Please join us when we welcome <u>Dr. Gary P. Zola</u>, Executive Director Emeritus of <u>The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives</u> in Cincinnati, for two scholar-inresidence programs on Thursday and Friday, February 22-23 at the Temple.

During the first learning session on Thursday, February 22 at 7 p.m., Dr. Zola will examine "George Washington, Jews, and the Story of Religious Freedom in America." To celebrate the 292nd anniversary of President Washington's birth, Dr. Zola will provide our community with an opportunity to take a deep dive into Washington's most famous letter to the Jewish community.

President George Washington's letter to the Jews of Congregation Yeshuat Israel (a.k.a. "Touro Synagogue"), Newport, Rhode Island – written in 1790 – famously promised that the United States would be a nation that "gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance. Washington reassured the Jews of Newport that, in his opinion, the new Constitution guaranteed every religion in America – including Judaism – "full and equal membership" in the nation's polity.

This dynamic text-study constitutes a special opportunity to learn more about the history of this well-known letter which was written more than 233 years ago. We will discover why Washington's letter has much to teach us about the history of religious freedom in America.

Dr. Zola also will speak during our Shabbat service on Friday, February 23 at 7:30 p.m. on "The Future of The Past! The Meaning of our 175th Anniversary," an inspiring look at the significance of milestone anniversaries in Jewish life. An Oneg Shabbat will follow. The service also will be available on YouTube.

As Congregation Achduth Vesholom celebrates 175 years of continuous existence, Dr. Zola will help us to reflect on the historical lessons we derive from the congregation's remarkable longevity and durability. What traits and impulses have our predecessors bequeathed to us, and how will these characteristics strengthen us as we confront the daunting and worrisome challenges we face in our own day and age? Dr. Zola will offer us an inspiring message in response to these important questions.

Gary Phillip Zola served as the executive director of The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives (AJA) from 1998 through June of 2023. Currently, Dr. Zola maintains his faculty status as the Edward M. Ackerman Family Distinguished Professor of the American Jewish Experience & Reform Jewish History at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR).


Help is Available

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
















PJ Our Way is for kids ages 9-11. It is kid-driven - they choose their own books, creating a totally tailored experience based on their own interests and reading level. To
