

"We Stand Together" - Update from The Jewish Agency for Israel

Since its foundation in 1929, The Jewish Agency for Israel is responsible for ensuring that every Jewish person feels an unbreakable bond to one another and to Israel, so that we all can continue to play our role in our ongoing Jewish story. From the establishment of the State of Israel and its vital institutions to facilitating Aliyah (more than 3.5 immigrants to Israel) and to strengthening and supporting Israel's most vulnerable populations, The Jewish Agency has been there for almost a century. In the early hours of Shabbat, *Simchat Torah*, October 7, 2023, when thousands of Hamas terrorists infiltrated Israel and unleashed unimaginable hell on Israeli communities, our teams on the ground responded immediately thanks to this longstanding network by providing urgent aid to the thousands of terror victims, establishing support systems for war-hit communities, families, and businesses.

At present, as the true scale of the atrocities is revealed, our focus expands to launching community restoration projects and rehabilitation of communities, and to ensuring the safety and security of all the populations in our care and of Jewish communities worldwide. The Jewish Agency's Fund for Victims of Terror (FVOT) that supports families and individuals affected by terrorism and violence, has provided so far 8,252 immediate emergency grants, and is focusing on providing long-term rehabilitative care. We couldn't have done it without our many partners around the globe, Jewish communities and federations, donors and friends. Many small businesses in the communities near the Gaza border have either closed or been forced to completely cease their operations due to the ongoing war and security situation. With our partners, The Jewish Agency launched Support Business IL; a special initiative to help small businesses in southern Israel by providing immediate grants to businesses in the impacted communities. Additionally, our SparkIL platform provides support to small businesses throughout Israel that have been affected by the war. Applicable small businesses benefit from interest-free loans which will help them weather this crisis.

The impact of the war has reached every part of Israeli society. The Jewish Agency is facilitating expanded support for Israeli senior citizens, many of whom are Holocaust survivors, vulnerable Israeli youth in the geographic and social periphery and new Olim. More than 4,000 new olim from Ethiopia, Ukraine and Russia were living in the region under rocket threat and are experiencing the psychological impact of the war. Our teams stepped in to offer them safety and respite, evacuating the olim in the line of fire to safer locations, providing housing, psychological counseling, as well as education for children, activities for adults, and supplemental income for lost work because of the displacement.

Currently, we are already working on the next stage, to bring Jewish communities together from around the world to facilitate rehabilitation. Together we aim at guaranteeing that no one is left behind and at building a stronger future for Israel and world Jewry. The displaced communities face a long road to recovery. Communities2Gether pairs each impacted Israeli community with a Jewish community abroad, offering sustained support for 3-5 years. Through funding, resources, and personal connections, these partnerships will rebuild infrastructure, mend social bonds, and foster lasting connections. Another initiative, Campers2Gether, offers a transformative experience, bringing Israeli teens impacted by the war to Jewish summer camps around the globe. Israeli campers will find healing and joy alongside supportive peers, discover hidden strengths, and gain a fresh perspective on their Israeli and Jewish identities. Jewish campers from outside Israel will make meaningful connections with Israeli teens, expand their understanding of Israel beyond the headlines, and build lasting friendships.

Volunteerism is another important aspect of our work. The Jewish Agency has mobilized a passionate force of volunteers from within Israel and beyond. Masa Israel Journey, and Partnership2Gether Fellows were leveraged to bring dedicated individuals and solidarity missions to Israel. Within Israel, our ShinShinim (year of service) volunteers, pre-army academy participants, and students lend a hand to Israeli senior citizens at our Amigour facilities and provide a vital support to their residents. More than 1,100 Masa volunteers, 500 daily (3,000 so far and counting) at our Nitzana educational village, and 650 pre-army academy participants have already stepped up to help during this challenging time. Moreover, The Jewish Agency identified vulnerabilities in several of our facilities in Israel's southern and northern regions. These shared spaces must be renovated to protect the elderly who are incapable of dashing to a shelter with short notice. Lastly, with the rise of Antisemitism and growing threats to Jewish communities around the globe, The Jewish Agency's Security Assistance Fund provides urgent financial security grants to strengthen security measures for Jewish institutions and activities worldwide outside the United States.

Throughout these endeavors, we cannot understate the importance of our partners and donors worldwide. Your support enables us to provide vital care to victims of terror, combat antisemitism, assist devastated communities, facilitate Aliyah, and strengthen connections among Jews globally. Thank you for standing with Israel, *Am Israel Chai*.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent



must be earned in the course work in order to qualify for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

Looking for a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation or special gift for one of our local youth, then please consider making that gift to their **S.K.I.P**. Fund account. An acknowledgment will be sent to you and a card indicating your gift will be sent to the designee.

Lion of Judah

History and usage

The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

The Pomegranate pin was introduced as a way to inspire giving from women of all stations. Three decades after its inception, more than 7,000 pins have been distributed across North America.



To qualify, women must donate \$1,800.00 or more to the Federation's Annual Campaign.

ISRAEL AT WAR: A VIEW FROM THE GROUND

Israel lost over 1,200 people on October 7, when thousands of Hamas terrorists burst through the Gaza border, launching a war which has dragged on for months — leading to tens of thousands of deaths and leaving both Israelis and Palestinians wondering what's next.

Please join us on Sunday, March 17 at 3 p.m. on Zoom to hear from <u>Sam Sokol</u>, political correspondent from *The Times of Israel*, who has been covering Israel's war against Hamas, both on the ground in the south and in the halls of the Knesset.

He has reported from Israel for the past 15 years and previously served as a correspondent for *Haaretz*, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, and *The Jerusalem Post*. Sokol also is the author of *Putin's Hybrid War and the Jews*, a book about Russia's weaponization of antisemitism and the <u>destruction of eastern Ukraine's Jewish communities</u>.


Dr. Wendy Soltz is an Assistant Professor of History and Director of the Public History Program at Ball State University. She regularly works with the public and non-profits to curate exhibitions, organize collections, and assist in historical programming. Wendy conceived of the Indiana Synagogue Mapping Project in 2018 while she was the Executive Director of the Indiana Jewish Historical Society. Over the course of five years and a grant from the National Parks Service, Wendy has made 45 survey stops and has conducted archival research to reveal and document 66 purpose-built synagogues across the State of Indiana from 1865-2015.

Greg Merrell is an I.T. Director for an Illinois-based consulting firm. He and his wife, Stacey, had always wanted to live in non-conventional housing. With roots in Indiana but requiring a quicker commute via the South Shore Line into Chicago, Greg and Stacey moved North. Thus began a 2-year project to convert Ahavath Shalom Synagogue into a Home.

This program is in-person at the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center. If you are unable to attend, registration is required to attend virtually. The link can be found at <u>Upcoming Events – Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society (neindianaigs.org)</u>.


Help is Available




