The Man Who Saved 669 Children

The Man Who Saved 669 Children - He never considered himself a hero, yet on the eve of World War II Nicholas Winton became The Man Who Saved 669 Children. Winton, a young London banker, was on the verge of departing for a skiing vacation on Christmas day 1938 when a friend called him from Prague asking for help. In the Czechoslovakian capital, Winton set up an extraordinary rescue operation for Jewish children threatened by the Nazis. From his hotel room, he organized the departure of trains to England and became a forger when he lacked authorizations and visas. His efforts allowed 669 children to board eight trains and make their way to London to find host families, new lives, and hope.

The program airs on PBS Fort Wayne (39-1) April 28th at 4pm; on PBS Explore (39-4) April 29th at 2pm, May 1st at 11pm, and May 2nd at 9am.

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne wishes you and your loved ones a very special and meaningful Pesach. Tradition has it that we leave an empty chair for the prophet Elijah to help usher in our people's redemption and peace throughout the land.

This year, during the Passover service, Jews all over the world will also set aside an additional empty chair (or chairs) in support of those who have lost their freedom and in honor of those who have lost loved ones during the ongoing war with Hamas. At our home, we chose to include at this extra chair, images and names of the hostages kidnaped during the October 7th attack in Israel.

We also took a moment for Hakarat HaTov, the Hebrew for gratitude. Hakarat HaTov is a reminder that we should be grateful that we are able to freely celebrate seder and are able to finish our Passover meal with full tummies. We also are reminded that this will not be experienced by everyone, as many have lost their freedom and many are going hungry.

Before you end the seder and announce to all, "L'Shana Haba'ah B'Yerushalayim or Next year in Jerusalem", take a moment to imagine what we'd like next year in Jerusalem to be like. May peace come to the State of Israel and its citizens. May the people of Israel celebrate the freedom of Pesach with their loved ones forever safely at their side.

On the evening of May 6th, 2024, our community will come together for a very special Yom HaShoah service to remember and honor the six million Jews murdered in the Holocaust, as well as the victims of the October 7th massacre in Israel. The service will be led by Rabbi Meir Bargeron. We will have special readings and listen to heartfelt music, as we reflect together on the pain, suffering, and loss sustained by the victims and their families.

Unfortunately, we know that as time passes, public knowledge about the Holocaust is diminishing. This reality, along with the frightening rise in antisemitism and hate based violence we are now witnessing, reminds us that "Never again" is not guaranteed. No matter what else is going on in the world, this Day of Remembrance is set aside for each of us to remember and learn from a history that must never be forgotten.

So, please join us the evening of May 6th at Congregation Achduth Vesholom to share together this very important commemoration. Students from New Tech High School will be in attendance to share their Holocaust related projects. We invite you to meet with them at the conclusion of the Yom HaShoah service. Please feel free to ask them questions about their projects and encourage them to continue to study this critical part of history.

To those who were lost during the Holocaust and October 7th on this Yom HaShoah, we remember you and will always keep you in our hearts.

On a personal note, I want to thank each of you who have either emailed, sent a letter or spoken to me in person with wishes for a healthy and happy retirement. It has been my great honor to serve as your Executive Director of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne. It is one of which I will always be eternally appreciative. I look forward to working with the new Executive Director to help assure a seamless transition, and I will continue to remain active and involved in the Fort Wayne Jewish community.

This year, celebrating *Pesach* (Passover) is with mixed feelings. We are grateful for the privilege of sitting together around the holiday's table, surrounded by family and friends. Yet our joy is not complete while so many families are still grieving for their missing members and are mourning the lost ones. In many homes, this Pesach, an empty chair waited for a loved one to return and the fifth cup of wine was raised while praying and hoping for the quick return of all the 133 hostages still held in Hamas captivity. *Chag HaHerut* (the Festival of Freedom) receives a different meaning this year. We are all carrying a prayer in our hearts for their immediate release and liberation. We read the Haggadah, and the story of our exodus as one people from slavery and darkness to freedom, while we recognize that this year the traditional story has another significance.

This Pesach, I wish to focus on our *Shlichim* (Israeli emissaries), who work in Jewish communities, synagogues, schools, youth movements and on campuses around the country. These young, talented and dedicated Israelis swung into action immediately following the events of October 7 to combat antisemitism and the delegitimization of Israel. Many suffered the loss of loved ones during the attacks and in the war that followed, some endured the evacuation of their entire communities in the southern and northern borders of Israel, and all of them were called on duty here to fulfill the true essence of their *shlichut* (mission): They provided invaluable resources to their communities, Israel education, advocacy tools, and a personal, meaningful connection to Israel. In many of the areas the Shlichim serve, they are the only available source of Israel education and connection. Because of their existing networks and extensive relationships, Shlichim were able to mobilize quickly to share personal stories as Israelis; speak publicly about what is happening in Israel and counter misinformation; initiate and take part in rallies, vigils and pro-Israel demonstrations; raise awareness for the hostages; take part in fundraising events; and much more. They organized more than 75,075 educational activities for more than 908,000 participants; 92 Israel Fellows on College Campuses supported 13,600 students who are encountering Antisemitism. During the eve of Pesach, many of them led local seders in their respective communities.

In the summer, they will be joined by the summer camps shlichim, who will come to bring Israel to Jewish summer camps nationwide. This summer, they will be part also of **Campers2Gether**—an initiative of The Jewish Agency for Israel and Mosaic United, together with our partners at the Foundation for Jewish Camp—to bring up to 1,500 Israeli teens ages 14 to 16 from the western Negev and northern Israel to 50 to 60 Jewish overnight camps in the U.S., Canada, Europe, and South America. Since October 7, Israeli teens have experienced overwhelming levels of anxiety and trauma. Compounding the stress of being unable to return home for weeks or even months, many have family members or friends who were killed, injured, or kidnapped. At the same time, Jewish teens around the world face unprecedented levels of antisemitism in their daily lives and encounter hateful misinformation about Israel spread on social media and among their peers. In 2024, Israeli teens will travel to camp in cohorts of up to 20 for two weeks of respite and cultural exchange, building supportive bonds with their peers from around the world.

On the eve of Passover, we read the Haggadah together and the words:

"בְּלֵּל דֵּזֹרְ עוֹמְדִּים עְלִינוּ לְכּלוֹתְנוּן" ("in every generation they rise up to destroy us"). But today, unlike at so many times in our history, we are capable of defending ourselves. In spite of our pain, we are able to rally together as a people to protect the Jewish state and people. As we witness the greatest crisis in the history of the State of Israel, we stand together to remember our shared destiny and our force to overcome destruction. I wish you and your loved ones a holiday of hope and besorot tovot (good blessings).

Lion of Judah

History and usage

The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

The Pomegranate pin was introduced as a way to inspire giving from women of all stations. Three decades after its inception, more than 7,000 pins have been distributed across North America.

In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. The holiday is celebrated 50 days after Passover.

Traditionally, the Book of Ruth is read on Shavuot because just as that story recounts how a young Moabite woman chose to become an Israelite so did the Israelites choose to accept the commandments when they stood before Mt. Sinai. It is customary to eat dairy foods on the holiday to symbolize the sweetness of Torah and the association of Israel as the land of milk and honey.




Help is Available


