We missed you this summer and can't wait to see you for brunch!



But as his online popularity soars, his real life gets increasingly worse: he is picked on by the school bully; he fights with his best friend; and he misses his mom, who has left the family to resolve her own issues. How to Survive Middle School is a sweet coming-of-age book about friendship, family, and following one's dreams.

<u>Under the Domim Tree</u> by Gila Almagor Recommended for ages 11+



This book is a special selection for Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Memorial Day). Can you imagine living in a youth village, with no parents telling you what to do all the time? Aviya, Yola, and Mira do, but it's not as easy as you might think...This is a powerful and emotional

story about three girls who live together after World War II. It is a story of hope and friendship and the power of forgiveness.

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PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

New York Times and USAToday bestselling author Marie Benedict was the 42nd speaker for the People of the Book program hosted by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne. She spoke to a near-capacity crowd on Monday evening, September 9th at the Rifkin Campus. Marie Benedict is the author of eight works of historical fiction, *The Only Woman in the Room, The Mystery of Mrs. Christie, Carnegie's Maid, The Other Einstein, Lady Clementine, Agent 355, Her Hidden Genius, The Mitford Affair,* and, with Victoria Christopher Murray, the Instant New York Times Bestseller and GoodMorning America Book Club pick, *The Personal Librarian*.

Ms. Benedict concluded her speech with a question-and-answer session and a book signing.

Get ready to savor delicious delicatessen when the Temple's <u>Corned Beef on Rye – Sure to Satisfy Fundraiser</u> returns on Thursday, November 7 for a 22nd year.

What's new this year? The biggest change is that we will not have drivethru pick up of orders. Simply park in our spacious lot and walk up to the building, where multiple pick-up stations will be set up for your convenience. In addition, customers who pre-order meals will be able to take advantage of special early bird pick up beginning at 10 a.m., an hour before our regular 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. hours.

Boxed meals are \$18 each when ordered by Friday, October 25. After that date and at the door, meals are \$21 each. Meals include a heaping 1/3-pound corned beef sandwich on rye, giant pickle, creamy coleslaw, fudgy brownie, and a drink.

LOOKING AHEAD TO GENEALOGY CONFERENCE

Several members of the Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society attended the 44th IAJGS International Conference on Jewish Genealogy in Philadelphia in August. They were there not only to learn, but to promote next year's conference happening in Fort Wayne, August 10-14, 2025! Bethany Sutherland, from Visit Fort Wayne, and Curt Witcher, from the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center, traveled to Philadelphia to help promote the conference.

Thus began a year of planning, marketing and fundraising for this major event in our Jewish community's history. Approximately 900 people attended the 2024 conference, and we hope to draw a similar number to our area next summer.

Publicity. The website for the conference – www.iajgs2025.org is now online with lots of information and four promotional videos that highlight Fort Wayne and the Genealogy Center. A virtual informational event is planned for Sunday, November 10th beginning at 2:00 which will include information about the Genealogy Center and Fort Wayne, and allow for lots of Q&A. And the IAJGS 2025 Conference Discussion group on Facebook is up and running, fielding questions about the conference. Thanks to Betsy Gephart and Pam Friedman for their work in this area.

Fundraising. Irv Adler has been hard at work raising funds for the conference, with the help of Irene Walters. Thanks to several large donors, \$60,000 has been raised toward a goal of \$100,000. Larger donors include the Leona Z. Rosenberg Charitable Trust, NEIJGS board members, the Goldenberg Charitable trust, NEIJGS member Jody Tzucker, and a grant from the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation. Lion of Judah

History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.





It represents the best of what Federation does – bringing together like-minded donors to do a world of good.


Help is Available
