

Happy & Health New Year to All



I would like to remind everyone of our wonderful Violins & Hope program that will begin on Sunday, March 9th and run through Sunday, March 23rd.

Some quick history from what is already five years ago: The 2019 *Violins of Hope* commemoration was the largest and most successful multi-organizational event of its kind in the history of Fort Wayne. Not only did 80,000 people experience a myriad of programs over a two week period in November 2019, but the project won national acclaim, earning a special category award by Arts United at its prestigious Arts United Awards.

In addition, over 250 musicians from the community brought to life the sound, presence, and stories of *Violins of Hope*. Through dozens of local area performances, local artists helped honor the memories of the brave musicians who owned and played these historic instruments.

VIOLINS & HOPE: INSIDE AMNON'S WORKSHOP, MARCH 9-23, 2025

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne will be partnering with the new <u>Pearl Street Arts Center</u> in March 2025 to produce its next two-week, multi-venue commemoration. Based on Fort Wayne's groundbreaking and highly successful 2019 *Violins of Hope* commemoration, the 2025 version will center on a photographic exhibition of the violins and instrument workshop of *Violins of Hope* founder Amnon Weinstein taken by Cleveland photographer Daniel Levin and his subsequent book called *Violins and Hope*.

Levin's exhibition includes 43 masterfully printed and framed photographs of selections of the Violins and Hope book. Each photograph has a rich back story. This beautiful series of photographs documents Weinstein's collection of violins, his workshop in Tel Aviv, and his processes for restoration.

These photographs serve not only to document a place, they reveal the ethereal. For what Weinstein has done with these lost violins has been to transform tragic loss into triumph in the most insightful and powerful way imaginable. The care that Levin has taken to hone in on the idiosyncrasies of Amnon's workshop, and his uncanny ability to celebrate the beauty of light, is nothing short of remarkable. These are beautiful photographic representations of Amnon's delicate and enduring violins that have miraculously survived the Holocaust.

"Violins & Hope: Inside Amnon's Workshop", will feature a series of concerts, lectures, film screenings, seminars, and interfaith events at Pearl Arts and across the community in support of an exhibition of Levin's photography, on display in the gallery at the University of St. Francis.

We will be sending out specific calendar and event updates of the two week program as we move closer to our commemoration. Please know how hard so many within the Jewish Federation and our community at large have worked to bring this event to Fort Wayne.



In observance of Presidents Day, our office will be closed on Monday, February 17.







What are we talking about this month:

Be an Eco Kid: Easy Activities to Get in the Tu B'Shevat Spirit



All year round, it's important to take care of the <u>environment</u>. There are many, many everyday ways to help. We can pick up trash, <u>recycle</u>, and compost. We can turn off lights and not waste water. We can walk or ride a bike instead of driving in the car.

On Tu B'Shevat, we dedicate ourselves to doing all of these things, and we also plant. If you live where it's too cold for outdoor planting, you can plant indoors or give money to a local charity or conservation effort to plant trees.

Protect a Tree

Even when we're not planting them, trees may need our protection. Is there a tree in your yard or neighborhood that could use some care?

Water it.

When the weather stays hot and sunny, most trees appreciate a drink.

Weed it.

Invasive grasses and weeds can stress a tree out. Pull them out by the roots so they don't grow back.

Clean it.

Pick up litter around your tree (and elsewhere).

Hug it!

Hey, it can't hurt.



Plant a Tree

Here are some fertile tips for planting your own trees:



Wait until the best time for planting. If the Jewish birthday of the trees isn't the right time to plant where you live, pick a different season. You can at least use Tu B'Shevat to "plant" your intention.

Look for trees that work well in your growing zone. Your favorite tree may not be the best fit for your climate. Find a tree that will be happy growing beside you.

No yard? Consider a container sapling. Some trees can grow for quite a while in a large container. Then eventually you can transplant it into a permanent location. However you do it, the more trees there are

in the world, the better off we all are.

Plant Parsley

Here's a lovely way to "cross-fertilize" your Jewish holidays. Plant parsley in a specially decorated flower pot for Tu B'Shevat, and pick the parsley just in time for Passover!



Sprout an Avocado Pit

Want to grow your own tree for Tu B'Shevat (or anytime)? The next time you eat an avocado, save the pit for sprouting.

Lion of Judah

History and usage

The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

The Pomegranate pin was introduced as a way to inspire giving from women of all stations. Three decades after its inception, more than 7,000 pins have been distributed across North America.



It represents the best of what Federation does – bringing together like-minded donors to do a world of good.

To qualify, women must donate \$1,800.00 or more to the Federation's Annual Campaign.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.




A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent must be earned in the course work in order to qualify







Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$108.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

Looking for a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation or special gift for one of our local youth, then please consider making that gift to their **S.K.I.P**. Fund account. An acknowledgment will be sent to you and a card indicating your gift will be sent to the designee.

THE REFORM MOVEMENT IN AMERICA TODAY

Please join us for the Temple's next lifelong learning program exploring <u>"The Reform Movement in America Today,"</u> beginning Wednesday, February 12 at 7 p.m. on Zoom.

The Reform Movement, with its origins in Germany, is America's largest Jewish movement. Congregation Achduth Vesholom is one of the nearly 850 congregations in North America affiliated with the <u>Union for Reform Judaism</u>. According to the Pew Research Center, 2.8 million Jews live in the U.S. and 38% identify as Reform.

In this series led by Rabbi Meir, we will focus discussions based on episodes of Re-Form, a recent podcast series from Tablet Studios, supplemented with Jewish texts presented during the class.

Re-Form focuses on five questions or issues that have defined the movement in the modern era. Participants are highly encouraged to listen to the podcast episode in advance, but this is not required. Come prepared to learn, to question and to share your views on what it means to be a Reform Jew in America today.

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is excited to welcome researcher, Jakub Czuprynski, for a free virtual program on Sunday, February 9th.

SEEKING POLISH ANCESTORS

• 2:00 pm (EST) – Jewish Genealogy Gems Hidden in the Polish Archives

Jakub Czuprynski will present strategies for those individuals with Polish roots who would like to expand their searches to less popular archival resources that can be found in the Polish State Archives. In this lecture, guidelines on how to search for additional family information not covered in the obvious sources will be discussed. Additionally, participants will become familiar with the various alternative sources for genealogy research.

Jakub is a researcher, guide and travel journalist who specializes in the family history of Polish Jews. For about 15 years he has been running his own business carrying out professional genealogical research and organizing heritage tours in Poland. Mr. Czuprynski collaborates with Jewish Record Indexing, Jewish Culture Festival (Krakow), and the Jewish Community Centre in Krakow where he organizes meetings and lectures on genealogy. He is particularly interested in attempts to use lesser-known historical sources to research the histories of Jewish families from Galicia.


Help is Available




