Each summer, she serves on the faculty at the URJ 6 Points Creative Arts Academy. She is a Jewish Studio Project Fellow, a Rukin Rabbinic Fellow at 18 Doors (formerly Interfaith Family), and a Past President of the Women's Rabbinic Network. #### Join us for a Women's Passover Seder



#### **Violins & Hope: Inside Amnon's Workshop**



Friends,

I am proud to share with you the wonderful events that will soon be taking place in our community. We will be continuing the tradition that began with Violins of Hope in 2019, with a series of programs built around a very special photographic exhibit at the University of Saint Francis Rolland Art Center. Please join us in welcoming this exhibition and the supporting events to Fort Wayne.

**Violins & Hope: Inside Amnon's Workshop** is a photographic exhibition of the violins and instrument workshop of Israeli luthier Amnon Weinstein, founder of the **Violins of Hope** project. Created by Cleveland photographer Daniel Levin, the exhibition is on display at the Rolland Art Center at the University of Saint Francis from March 11-23, 2025. Levin's 43 masterfully printed and framed photographs document Wein-

stein's collection of violins, his workshop in Tel Aviv, and his processes for restoration.

Levin's photographs serve not only to document a place, but they also reveal the ethereal. For what Weinstein has done with these lost violins has been to transform tragic loss into triumph in the most insightful and powerful way imaginable. The care that Levin has taken to home in on the idiosyncrasies of Amnon's workshop, and his uncanny ability to celebrate the beauty of light, is nothing short of remarkable. These are beautiful photographic representations of Amnon's delicate and enduring violins that have miraculously survived the Holocaust.

Supporting the exhibition is a two-week commemoration of concerts, documentary film screenings, and events at various Fort Wayne locations relating to music and the Holocaust. See pages 6 - 7 for more information.

In addition, four historical instruments from the *Violins of Hope* collection will be on display in the exhibition and performed at events throughout the community.

### **Courageous Queens: A List of Vashti and Esther Stories**



Ometz lev, the Hebrew word for courage, literally means strength of heart. A strong, brave heart is needed whenever one tries something new by conquering one's fears or stands up for one's beliefs. Childhood is typically a time of many fears, with these fears morphing and changing each time a child enters a new developmental stage.

Children benefit greatly from reading about heroes who courageously face their fears. Inspiration is found in the lives of contemporary heroes such as Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg and in Biblical heroes like Moses, Judah

Maccabee, and of course, Queen Esther and Queen Vashti from the Purim story.

Esther and Vashti both stood up for themselves—and their beliefs- in different ways: Vashti by refusing to compromise her values to appease the king and Esther by revealing her true identity to save the Jewish people. Recommended for ages 6 to 8

The story of Purim has many elements of a fairy tale — a beautiful queen, a dastardly villain, and of course, a satisfying ending. But Esther doesn't love dressing up and being the center of attention — she's not interested in playing the Cinderella role. How will she muster the will to do what needs to be done?

#### The Story of Queen Esther by Jenny Koralek

The king may have married Queen Esther because she was beautiful – but she was smart and brave, too, which is why she was able to save her people.



#### Queen Esther Saves Her People by Rita Golden Gelman

Recommended for ages 8 and up

Long, long ago a young Jewish woman named Esther was chosen to be the Queen of Persia. The king's prime minister proceeds to scheme against the kingdom's Jewish citizens. How will Esther find the courage to stand up for the rights of her people?

Recommended for ages 6 to 8

Queen Vashti was hanging out with her friends when the King rudely summoned her to entertain him. He didn't even ask nicely! What's a strong, independent woman to do in that situation?

#### The Story of Esther: A Purim Tale by Eric A. Kimmel

Recommended for ages 8 and up

The Purim story, full of drama, brings together a mighty king, a jealous scoundrel, and a wise uncle. At its center is a clever heroine, Queen Esther. It was her courage that saved the Jewish people at a dangerous time.

#### Lion of Judah

#### History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

#### Who They Are:

### **Pomegranate Pin**

Eric Schreier, Federation member, spoke at the Fort Wayne Rotary Group on January 20th, 2024 about his recent trip to the Western Galilee

Good afternoon, fellow Rotarians.

I recently returned from a profoundly moving medical mission trip to the Western Galilee, an area that spans from the Christian town of Nazareth to the northern borders of Lebanon and the Mediterranean coast. During my time there, I had the privilege of practicing medicine and surgery at the 770-bed Western Galilee Medical Center in Nahariya. This city is situated just six miles from the Lebanese border and, at the time of my service, had its northern citizens evacuated to safer areas in the south.

The Western Galilee Medical Center serves a remarkably diverse population, encompassing people of various religions and cultures, which includes Jews, Christians, Muslims, and Druze. In fact, the hospital's CEO is Muslim, and the medical director of the Level 1 trauma emergency room is Christian. Israeli Muslims make up 25% of the population, Christians 10%, and Druze 5%.

The hospital, which caters to over 700,000 people, had, until recently, operated from bomb and chemical weapons-resistant shelters underground to ensure the safety of its patients. In 2018, I was honored to be part of a medical team providing care to approximately 3,300 Syrian War wounded, including many rebel fighters with severe injuries. Our goal was to rehabilitate these individuals so they could return home to their loved ones, under the auspices of the International Red Cross.

As Rotarians know well, service to others comes with great responsibility. I volunteered for this mission with the hope of contributing to a healthier future for all those in need, regardless of their religion, culture, or nationality. Like Rotary, the dedicated staff at the Western Galilee Medical Center perform their work with unwavering respect and sensitivity, embracing the diverse needs of the community.

Rotary members are renowned for their commitment to volunteerism. Our service to others is a testament to the fact that compassion and care transcend borders and divisions. Fostering goodwill and cooperation across different cultures and faiths is one of the foundations upon which Rotary is built.

During my time in the Western Galilee, I aspired to make a meaningful difference for all concerned. Thank you for allowing me to share my service experience with you today.

- 2:00pm <u>The Arolsen Archives and Other Sources for Holocaust Research</u>: The Arolsen Archives houses the world's largest
  collection of Nazi persecution records, including documents on concentration camps and forced labor. Other sources offer
  survivor testimonies, historical documents, and research tools. Bruce will outline these resources to help people preserve the
  memory and history of those affected.
- 4:00pm <u>Case Study of Holocaust Research</u>: Holocaust research plays a vital role in preserving history and ensuring the world never forgets. Bruce will review how he has investigated survivor testimonies, Nazi records, and the role of bystanders and collaborators to piece together the full picture of the individuals he has researched.

**Bruce Colegrove** has been a teacher of Spanish and World Literature at Fort Wayne's Canterbury High School since 1999. In addition to his work in the classroom, he has tutored students in the Fort Wayne Jewish community for their b'nei mitzvah while serving as a Jewish educator at Congregation Achduth Vesholom. In 2013, Bruce taught his first course on *Music in the Holocaust*, sparking his deep and ongoing research into the Auschwitz-Birkenau women's orchestra. In recent years, he has expanded his teaching to include semester-long courses on Genocide and Holocaust Literature at Canterbury HS. Currently, he is developing an original screenplay about Alma Rosé and the women's orchestra at Birkenau.


### Help is Available
