# GUEST COLUMNIST - IRV ADLER NORTHEAST INDIANA JEWISH GENEALOGY SOCIETY, TREASURER

In August 2010, after returning from a trip to Vienna with my wife, Fran, I discovered 102 letters from my grandmother and other relatives to my mother, Elsa, who had escaped from Vienna in September 1938 and had gone to England to work as a domestic, and then to the United States in March 1940. The letters covered the period from September 20, 1938, to November 30, 1941, when the letters stopped. They contained 250 names of relatives, close family friends, acquaintances, and other persons. Many of these names I had never heard of before.

Without the discovery of these letters and the research that I did to add historical context and to identify family members and important relationships, I probably would have gone through life without knowing anything about one-quarter of my ancestral family, who emanated from Lemberg, Galicia, simply because my mother was emotionally unable to speak about her mother and the maternal side of her family.

Ninety-three of the 102 letters were written by my grandmother, Clara Bader Nichtern. The other nine were written by cousins and uncles. From the letters, I learned that my mother and grandmother had an exceptionally close relationship. Not only was my mother an only child, but mother and grandmother lived together in the same apartment for 25 years, and it was only the two of them after my grandmother's divorce in 1921. From her letters, it was unambiguously clear what a kind, generous and loving person my grandmother was – to a fault.

My grandmother was very reluctant to be the bearer of bad news; instead, she glossed over bad situations, delayed the mention of them until weeks later, or did not mention them at all. Among her "rose-colored glasses" depiction of the continually worsening situation in Vienna were: downplaying the events of Kristallnacht; downplaying her nephew's May 1940 forced labor assignment at the Sandhof work camp and then again, a few months later, at the Marchegg camp; referring to the restart of the mass deportation to the East with the words "the tragic drama here" and not much else; waiting for more than a month to tell my mother that my grandmother's brother, Leon Bader, and her nephew, Markus Bader, had been deported to the General Gouvernment in March 1941; waiting several months to tell my mother about her April 1941 interview, which led to her relocation to the second district in Vienna, as part of the staging of the Viennese Jewish population ahead of the mass deportation; totally downplaying the expulsion from her apartment of 28 years in August 1941, to sharing one room with one person and then two people in a collection apartment; and never ever mentioning the ultimate humiliation to the Jewish population of Vienna, the September 1941 edict requiring Jews to wear the Yellow Star.

However, the letters from the other relatives were more explicit in their description of their desperate situation in Vienna. Below are selected translated extracts from letters from two of Elsa's cousins, Emma Spielmann Löff and Carl Spitz.

The first letter, written on March 16, 1941, is from Emma to Elsa. Emma was the daughter of Rosalie Bader Spielmann, Clara's sister. Emma was desperately trying to get out of Vienna with her husband, Adolf, and son, Kurt. She wrote to my mother, who was by then in New York City, for help. The family was never able to get out of Vienna and were eventually murdered at Auschwitz.

Dearest Elsa,

....Now you are, dearest Elsa, the only relative in the USA. And, at the same time, our only hope.

After an endlessly long time the affidavit from the consulate was found and the investigation occurs immediately upon presentation of the ship tickets.

We ask you intimately, ... help us for the required amount and arrange the payment at the Joint.

....Should you alone not be in position to raise this sum, request the relatives, friends, and other acquaintances to raise portions of the required money....It is completely impossible to obtain a visa in any other way in spite of passing the examination that filtered applicants.

Besides the Atlases, with whom you are in contact, I also have telegraphed Egon Weiss.... I beg you to raise these necessary amounts together with the Atlases, Egon and Asinoff and for the time being to start with the Atlases and Egon Weiss.

The hard labor Dolfi is performing – to which he is unaccustomed – is the utmost burden to him. Dolfi's health is not the best.

.... Once again Else, I implore you to help us. You are our only hope.

Heartfelt greetings and kisses, Emma, and Kurt Löff.

The second letter is from Carl Spitz. Carl and his brother Otto were able to leave Vienna shortly after the Anschluss and went to Belgium. Then Carl went to England. In February 1940, he left England and went to New York and shortly thereafter to San Francisco. Carl's sister, Grete, like my mother, was able to escape from Vienna and went to England in early 1939 to work as a domestic. Carl, Otto, and Grete were the children of Clara's first cousin, Anna Spitz. Anna was never able to get out of Vienna and died of heart and health conditions. Her children survived.

The second letter, written on June 21, 1941, is from Carl to Elsa.

#### Dear Elsa.

I receive regular mail from home and just recently 3 letters came one after another. In every letter Mother writes how happy she is when she is with Tante Clara and how she always looks forward to Wednesday, when Clara makes her weekly visit.

....Indeed, Elsa, how happy we would be if our mothers could be here with us! Our worries would be removed. But the way things are now, it would be a miracle, if we would succeed. With the departure of many of the American consulates from almost all of Europe and especially with the latest Policy proceeding from Washington, the last bit of hope has just about been snuffed out. Even I could not obtain the first small affidavit... and now all attempts at obtaining an affidavit are mainly illusory. ....

On a more positive note, the letters mentioned sweet little Pauli. Pauli/Paul is the son of Benno and Josefine Spielmann. Since the names of Spielmann family members are among the most frequent names of the letters, I decided to carry out research on them.

In April 2014, working with a staff scholar at the USHMM specializing on the use of the International Tracing Service (now Arolsen Archives), we discovered that Paul survived the camps and arrived in Israel in 1945. Then, through a series of serendipitous events,

I found out that Paul was alive, had changed his name to Shaul and lived in Ashkelon, Israel. Then on July 12, 2014, I met Shaul, who is now 92 years old, at his son's home in Huntington Woods, Michigan. Since then, I have been with Shaul several times, both in Huntington Woods and in Israel, and regularly see him and speak with him on Zoom.

Besides finding and connecting with Shaul, I have identified members of the Bader and Spielmann families who were victims of the Holocaust and have memorialized them by placing Stones of Remembrance at their last known residences in Vienna.

None of the above would have been possible without the discovery of my mother's letters. And I expect that I would never have had any knowledge of these family members and of my ancestral ties to Lviv, Ukraine, formerly the Galician capital city of Lemberg.







# The Lag B'Omer Lowdown: History & Activities

In Jewish tradition, we count the 49 days between the second night of Passover and the beginning of <u>Shavuot</u>. This is called *S'firat Ha'Omer* ("The Counting of the Omer"). On the 33rd day of counting, we celebrate the holiday of <u>Lag B'Omer.</u>

"Lag" is an abbreviated combination of two Hebrew letters that, according to Hebrew numerology, add up to the number 33.

#### **ABOUT LAG B'OMER**



Lag B'Omer is traditionally celebrated with great joy. Jewish sources offer a range of opinions as to the origins of this joy. The Talmud says Lag B'Omer celebrates the halt of a plaque that took the lives of thousands of students of the great teacher Rabbi Akiva.

Other sources say Lag B'Omer celebrates a victory for the armies of the Jewish leader Bar Kochba. Some associate Lag B'Omer with stories about Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai, a student of Rabbi Akiva and writer of an important Jewish text.

#### **CELEBRATING THE 33rd DAY**

A number of traditions and customs have developed around the holiday of *Lag B'Omer*. In Israel and beyond, for example, many families light bonfires to brighten up cities and countryside alike. In addition, many Jewish couples schedule weddings and parties on *Lag B'Omer*.

Interested in celebrating Lag B'Omer this year? Try one of these fun activities:

#### **Build a Campfire**

Lag B'Omer falls in mid-to- late spring, making it a great time to break out the camping gear — or at least light a fire in a fire pit. Don't forget to make some delicious s'mores!

#### **Pull Out the Bows & Arrows**

Israeli children typically play with bows and (suction-cup-tipped) arrows on *Lag B'Omer*, imitating students of Rabbis Akiva and Shimon who fooled the Romans by pretending they were hunting. Relay races are another fun holiday activity.

#### Put on a Parade

Some communities stage parades for *Lag B'Omer*. Your family can organize a parade of its own. March around the block or just around the house and yard.

#### **Get a Haircut**

Yes, a haircut! The Counting of the *Omer* is treated as a semi-mourning period, and observant Jews refrain from haircutting during such a time. Because *Lag B'Omer* suspends that restriction, it is a traditional time for young children to get their first haircuts.

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Calendars have turned to May and the countdown to the final day of school has begun. Kids look forward to a well-deserved break from their studies and eagerly await the arrival of summer with all of the wonderful things it entails.



#### Lion of Judah

#### History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

#### Who They Are:

## **Pomegranate Pin**

Here are some of the roles you might fill:


- > Help people check in and get their badges and other materials.
