
Hello Friends,

What a wonderful honor it was for the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne to be welcomed to so many local schools this past month. Administrators and teachers wanting to meet their students' needs and desires to better understand the Holocaust and Anti-Semitism led to some beautiful and engaging learning sessions. The thoughtful questions, respectful attention, and appreciation expressed by students and teachers served as a meaningful indicator of the value of our time in the classroom.

Our 2026 Confronting the Shoah and Teacher Symposium programs will further help to provide needed education and experience for our local educators, who will then be able to provide a wonderful educational experience for their students.

Our community, schools, and students are also facing some difficult challenges. School resource shortages, the inability to attract and retain the highest quality personnel, and security concerns continue within our state while we also face new challenges in terms of education. In Indiana, House Bill 1137 was enacted to require schools to cooperate with parents and religious groups in allowing students to leave school during the day for religious instruction. Large organizations have stepped in to facilitate students leaving our schools during the school day, which in turn reduces the quality, focus, and engagement of those remaining ("left behind") students. I am proud to share that the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and the Jewish community are actively working to address the negative impacts of the associated educational disruptions to our students.

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne will ALWAYS support our schools and students and we are excited to meet the challenges for and within our community.

## What are we talking about this month:

## 7 Simple Shavuot Recipes Kids Can Make

Seven weeks after Passover ends, it's time to celebrate Shavuot.



This holiday marks the biblical story of receiving the Ten Commandments and the Torah at Mt. Sinai. While many families don't regularly celebrate Shavuot, it's a holiday that's totally made for kids -a perfect excuse for sleepovers, flower picking, ice cream socials, and lots

of other fun activities.

One very delicious and fun Shavuot tradition is eating dairy. Some people say that the reason to consume dairy treats on Shavuot is because not eating meat makes everyone feel lighter, physically-a good reminder about the spiritual light that comes with receiving the Torah. Some popular Shavuot treats include blintzes, bourekas-a cheese stuffed pastry from Israel, and of course, cheesecake. If your kids are interested in cooking on their own, check out these easy recipes for Shavuot. Most can be made with very little help from a grownup.

#### **Shortcut Cheese Blintzes**



Make your own cheese blintzes with a loaf of bread, a rolling pin, and some cream-cheese. There are variations on this recipe all over the internet-try this super easy take from Allrecipes.com – just be sure to have a grown-up supervise the baking.

#### **DAILY PACKING LIST**

**WATER BOTTLES** – Please provide 2-3 water bottles (1.5-2 liters/3-4 pints) each day to help your child stay hydrated during active outdoorsy summer days.

SUNSCREEN MUST be applied before camp. An ADDITIONAL BOTTLE OF SUNSCREEN must be sent in your camper's bag for reapplying before swim time.

**MOSQUITO REPELLENT** CAN be applied before camp. An **ADDITIONAL BOTTLE OF REPELLENT** must be sent in your camper's bag for reapplying later in the day if needed.

LUNCHPlease include an ice pack if needed.SNACKPlease send a healthy snack with your child to enjoy after swim.SWIMSUITA swimsuit can be worn to camp.BEACH TOWELPLASTIC BAG for storing wet items after swim timeTENNIS SHOES for hiking the trails and for playing active games



Please take a moment to write your child(ren)'s name on all of their belongings, including their **book bag, lunch box, water bottles, swim suit, towel,** sunscreen and bug repellent bottles. It is much easier for our staff to return misplaced items to their rightful owners when each item is marked with a camper's name.

#### **Please note:**

Our campers stay very active throughout the day. We spend a greater part of each camp day swimming, hiking, playing sports and active outdoor games. Don't be surprised if your child is more tired than usual and needs extra rest in order to get the most out of his or her camp experience the next day.

#### Things NOT to bring to camp:

- electronic devices
- personal toys

Electronics and personal toys brought to camp will be stored and returned to the camper and parent at the end of the day. Camp Joe staff is not responsible for lost or damaged items.

## Lion of Judah



#### History and usage

The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

## Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.


## **Pomegranate Pin**

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

The Pomegranate pin was introduced as a way to inspire giving from women of all stations. Three decades after its inception, more than 7,000 pins have been distributed across North America.

It represents the best of what Federation does - bringing together like-minded donors to do a world of good.

To qualify, women must donate \$1,800.00 or more to the Federation's Annual Campaign.

#### SHARE SHAVUOT WITH OUR TEMPLE FAMILY

Please join us for our Shavuot and Yizkor service on Sunday, June 1 at 7 p.m. at the Temple when we celebrate the giving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai, led by Rabbi Meir Bargeron. Join us in person or <u>on</u> YouTube.

In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. The holiday is celebrated 50 days after Passover. Traditionally, the Book of Ruth is read on Shavuot because just as that story recounts how a young Moabite woman chose to become an Israelite so did the Israelites choose to accept the commandments when they stood before Mt. Sinai.

It is customary to eat dairy foods on the holiday to symbolize the sweetness of Torah and the association of Israel as the land of milk and honey.

The International Association of Jewish Genealogical Associations (IAJGS) is holding its <u>annual conference</u> in Fort Wayne this year from August 10 to 14. It's a huge vote of confidence in our city and the <u>Northeast Indiana</u> Jewish Genealogy Society (NEIJGS)!


## WE ARE HERE TO HELP

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
# PJ Library<sup>®</sup>
