

MICHAEL THEISE - EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As we move into summer, with a great Camp Joe Levine season ahead, I wanted to share with the community how our 104th year as a Jewish Federation is wrapping up. In May, we had a flurry of in-school requests and activities regarding Holocaust education and antisemitism awareness. The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne supported our schools through a number of presentations and question & answer sessions.

The reception from students and teachers was tremendous. What I was most touched by were those students and teachers who approached me individually to share how they enjoyed some part of our Violins & Hope event from two months earlier. Students who attended the musical training or the exhibit (including student art work) at University of Saint Francis, teachers who were in attendance for the Jewish-Catholic Prayer Service all had such wonderful comments to share about Violins & Hope.

This prompted me to include a letter that was received by the Jewish Federation:

The March 20, 2025 Jewish-Catholic Prayer Service hosted by St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church and parish, facilitated by parishioner Jim Palermo, One of the Righteous, was, in particular, one unbelievably powerful experience. Jaki Schreier, Bonnie Pomerantz, Samara Sheray, the entire steering committee, Rabbi Meir, Mike Rush, Ronnie and Norm Greenberg, and Marcia Reynolds as prayer-service principals deserve the thanks of two faith communities. If this service did not unite us as one, it at least brought us closer together in spirit for one magical evening.

For the vast majority of the 1200-strong St. Vincent de Paul parishioners present, this may have been their only contact with folks they knew for a certainty to be Jewish. What a positive impression you all made, regardless your role or the nature of your contribution. Rabbi Meir's offerings were special--divine. Mike Rush's reading of Juliek's Violin will be remembered by all for many moons. As I witnessed what unfolded that evening, I was never prouder to be a member of the Fort Wayne Jewish community.

I make that statement, having resided in Fort Wayne the last 70 years. Only the four-week long Violins of Hope program six years ago was embraced by the entire community as a Jewish-sponsored event more than this year's sequel Violins and Hope celebration. Only the 2019 Holocaust violin-quartet program and prayer service at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Church in Aboite Township was attended and appreciated as enthusiastically, by over 1,000 Catholics, as this year's similar program and service at St. Vincent de Paul. Only that program in 2019 engendered the same spirit of good will and solidarity with their Jewish brethren from as sizeable a local Catholic population as was prompted the evening of March 20, 2025.

It is important that we feel wonderful about what we provide for the community and always remember that we have an opportunity to create goodwill and very special memories for those we interact with.

Lion of Judah

History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript, showing the course and grade received, and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent must be earned in the course work in order to qualify



for reimbursement.



Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$108.00 to the most recent Federation Annual Campaign, which runs from November through March.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

Looking for a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation or special gift for one of our local youth, then please consider making that gift to their **S.K.I.P**. Fund account. An acknowledgment will be sent to you and a card indicating your gift will be sent to the designee.


Help is Available




