



We are now entering the third year of sadness and sorrow for the victims of the massacre, violence, and destruction in Israel on October 7, 2023. Many of Israel's neighbors remain steadfast—and even more determined—in their desire to harm and destroy Israel and her people. Our hearts ache for so many: families, hostages, soldiers, communities throughout Israel, and all innocent victims, regardless of nationality, who continue to suffer.

As time marches on, we must remain focused on the needs of Israel and her people, who have endured unimaginable loss. Israel, as a nation, continues to live under relentless threats and violent attacks. Sadly, in parts of the Middle East, hatred of Israel is instilled from childhood, ensuring that cycles of hostility and radicalization persist. This grim reality reminds us how critical our support is.

My first message to you is this: do not forget the Israeli victims—citizens, soldiers, children, Holocaust survivors, and all others in need—each one deserving a full, rich, and beautiful life. The news can feel overwhelming and painful, yet the needs for healing, recovery, and dignity are staggering. We know from experience that government assistance often falls short. Families and communities must carry much of the burden, and we here in Fort Wayne must be counted among those who help shoulder that responsibility.

As I write on September 8, news is breaking of yet another terrorist shooting at a bus stop in Jerusalem, leaving many dead and wounded.

The violence of October 7, 2023, and the continued attacks since may fade from memory as time passes or as headlines shift. Please do not allow this tragedy, or its lasting impact, to be minimized. At the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, we are committed to helping those in Israel who are suffering and in need. We will continue to play our part in the healing process—and we ask you to stand with us.

My second message is one of gratitude and pride. Your Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne works tirelessly here in our own community to fulfill our mission: supporting and strengthening Jewish life, fostering our traditions, and providing for those in need. This is something we should all take deep pride in, as together we are making a tangible difference—both in Israel and here at home.

Thank you for your continued and generous support. It is because of you that these meaningful outcomes are possible.

Holiday 101: Shemini Atzeret



Have you ever heard of Shemini Atzeret? No? You're not alone

This holiday takes place right after *Sukkot* and offers a great opportunity to explore and talk about the weather with your children.

It's ok if this minor holiday is new to you—that's what this blog post is here for! Let's dive in:

History

This holiday takes place immediately after Sukkot. When the Temple stood in Jerusalem more than two thousand years ago, the people of Israel would make a pilgrimage there for Sukkot so they could observe the holiday together. After Sukkot, families would stay for one more day of celebration on Shemini Atzeret.



Since Shemini Atzeret also marks the beginning of the rainy season in Israel, it's traditional to say a prayer for rain.

Do



Learn about the weather, explore the outdoors, and practice saying the prayer for rain together.

Kick off a discussion with your children using these prompts:

- How do you feel when it rains and why?

- Rain nourishes the earth and helps plants to grow. What things do you need to help you grow big and strong?

Maya Prays for Rain by Susan Tarcov is a story all about Shemini Atzeret. In the book, Maya and her neighbors are enjoying a wonderful sunny, day outside when Maya realizes that it's Shemini Atzeret, the day when everyone prays for rain. Will the rains come and pour on the baseball game or her neighbors' laundry? Explore Maya's rich and diverse neighborhood while learning about this holiday.

In *Rainy Day Story* by Ruth Calderon, Rabbi Hanina Ben Dosa prays for the rain to stop—and it does! But soon he realizes there are consequences beyond his own comfort.

Lion of Judah

History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



BALL STATE UNIVERSITY A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.






Which books did you receive this month?
