


Rosh Chodesh Women's Group Movie Night



Take a historical, genealogical and culinary journey through the diaspora in homes across America. From Iraqi kubbeh to Ethiopian lentils to European kreplach, hear the personal history of the Jewish table in *Family Recipe: Jewish American Style*. Family narratives are revisited and secret ingredients revealed with the help of historians, genealogists and culinary experts—including the inimitable Joan Nathan, author of *My Life in Recipes*. These colorful comfort foods are brought to life in an eclectic mix of American kitchens and illustrated with treasured family photos, illuminating historical documents and a peek into one of the country's largest collections of Jewish American cookbooks.



What are we talking about this month:

Celebrating Hanukkah During the Christmas Season

My family kept a big box of Hanukkah decorations in the basement. Every year, a few days before Hanukkah, my

father would tell us it was time to open the box. Heading to the basement with Dad to get that box was thrilling, and what made the moment so memorable was that I knew my father also loved that box.

Kids intuitively pick up the attitude their parents bring to holidays. And for families of all religious backgrounds, the winter holiday season can be joyful ... but also stressful. There is the pressure of preparing for holidays, having your children compare your family's celebration to those of other families, and experiencing the consumerism around gift giving.

Many families raising Jewish children, no matter their level of observance, celebrate Hanukkah in the shadow of the Christmas season. The two overlapping holidays can raise questions for both kids and parents: "Why do we celebrate Hanukkah? How do we relate to all the Christmas celebrations around us? Does our family celebrate Christmas, Hanukkah, or both?" Each family has to navigate its own answers to these questions.

A ninth century midrash (rabbinic explanatory story) explains that Adam in the Garden of Eden became afraid of the early winter's shortening days. Once he saw that the days began to lengthen again, he created an eight-day festival of lights to help people get through wintertime darkness. This tale reflects the innate human impulse to seek ways to bring light into dark times, a theme that connects Hanukkah and Christmas despite their many differences.

The beautiful aspects that Hanukkah and Christmas celebrations share — lighting holiday lights and bringing joy to others — can be enjoyed while still feeling proud to be Jewish. After all, there is a delicate balance between preserving what is unique about being Jewish while also recognizing the contributions of other cultures and religions. That balance is central to the original <u>Hanukkah story</u>.



Because children intuitively sense their parents' attitudes, celebrating Hanukkah in ways that make you feel genuinely enthusiastic can naturally extend to your kids. Share what brings you light in winter. Perhaps it's finding ways to make your home feel especially cozy, eating delicious food, or simply hosting family and friends.

Find what's exciting and meaningful to you about the holiday, and your family will feel the warmth. By celebrating Hanukkah in ways that feel both joyful and authentic, you can model for your children how being Jewish is about the pride and the light they bring to the world.



Lion of Judah

History and usage


The Biblical Judah (in Hebrew: Yehuda) is the original name of the Tribe of Judah which is traditionally symbolized by a lion. In Genesis, the patriarch Jacob ("Israel") gave that symbol to his tribe when he referred to his son Judah as a Gur Aryeh, a "Young Lion" (Genesis 49:9) when blessing him. In Jewish naming tradition, the Hebrew name and the substitute name are often combined as a pair, as in this case. The Lion of Judah was used as a Jewish symbol for many years, and as Jerusalem was the capital of the Kingdom of Judah, in 1950 it was included in the Emblem of Jerusalem.

Who They Are:

Dynamic philanthropic Jewish woman who create social justice, aid the vulnerable, preserve human dignity and build Jewish identity. 17,500 women around the world are proud Lions of Judah, donating at least \$5,000.00 to Federation every year.

Pomegranate Pin

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations.

TUITION REIMBURSEMENT

The Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program.



A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on one-half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies.

As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

S.K.I.P (Send a Kid to Israel Program)

Established in 1984 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne in partnership with Congregation Achduth Vesholom, and revised



in November 1999, the program has provided a savings vehicle for many families and has helped make a trip to Israel a reality for so many of our youth. The Federation portion of the savings plan is provided by income from the Federation Endowment Fund for members of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

The Federation, for each year a child participates in **S.K.I.P.**, contributes \$200.00 per year per child. This is matched by a Congregational contribution of \$75.00 per year. Your parent contribution, on behalf of each participating child, is \$175.00 or more per year.

The program is available to local youth enrolled in their congregational religious school in grades 1-10. The fund may be used for an organized trip to Israel any time after grade 10 until the youth reaches age 23.

Each S.K.I.P account is supplemented by a gift from the HY AND LORRY GOLDENBERG BIRTHRIGHT FUND and the MINNETTE AND MEYER RUCHMAN FUND.

Looking for a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation or special gift for one of our local youth, then please consider making that gift to their **S.K.I.P**. Fund account. An acknowledgment will be sent to you and a card indicating your gift will be sent to the designee.


Help is Available


